SECONDARY WORK TO BE ELIMINATED Such is the Recommendation of A Special Committee at University. TO RAISE STANDARD OF WORK. In Normal Department Until it is on A Par With Other Branches of Institution's Curriculum. An explanation for the refusal of the University of Utah faculty to entertain a petition of the senior class for separate graduating exercises, is furnished by the making public a report of a special committee, which recommends that all secondary work at the University campus be eliminated, and that after a certain date only work of a college or university grade be carried on there. The move contemplates the giving of The move contemplates the giving of a degree with the normal school work, and the raising of the standard of this work until it is on a par with that of other branches of the University's cur-riculum, and commences abdive the grade of the High school. This condi-tion will be brought about within four years, so that to allow separate gradu-ations now would be merely a tempo-rary expedient, which would have to be abandoned in the near future. REPORT WAS UNANIMOUS.

The special committee which inves-tigated the matter was composed of William M. Stewart, principal of the normal school; Prof. Byron Curmings, professor of ancient languages and lit-erature; Prof. George Q. Coray, pro-fessor of economics; and Dr. J. F. Mer-rill, director of the school of mines. They started to work over a month ago, and their report, which is just pre-pared, finds unanimously in favor of doing away with the secondary school work. This move, it is held, was im-practicable, until the high school sys-tem of the state was more thoroughly established, and the erection of 15 high schools within the past few years has made the time opportune to work for the change. WILL BEGIN NEXT YEAR.

In arranging dates when the new methods shall become effective, it was recommended that no second year preparatory students be received next year, and that the first year of the present Normal school be eliminated. That will bring an end to preparatory work in two years and to Normal work below the college grade, in three years.

If the report is adopted, the work of eliminating the younger students will expand into a technical institution, giving work such as is now had at Chi-cago and Columbia. It will place the Normal department of the University at the head of western effort in that direction, and make it more thorough than that given anywhere else in the than that given anywhere else in the intermountain section.
