THE CANAL QUESTION.

Editors Deseret News.

The ideas expressed in Saturday's issue and signed "Citizen," in reference to the water canal, and bonds proposed to be issued by the city are worthy of serious consideration. I will give you some of my ideas, and I hope of many others in the following, in relation to the water, fuel and bond questions.

I am opposed to selling \$250,000.00 in bonds in the 'East' to capitalists. The absolutely essential capital to make the canal is labor, of which a large surplus is held at different times of the year, by the parties whom it is proposed to directly benefit with the improvement of their lands. It may require first-class financing to utilize the said capital to good advantage, but it can be done. I am interested in about 400 acres of land in Salt Lake Valley, consequently in the water that is a necessary adjunct to said land.

I do not desire that any company or party shall be able through representatives of the people to become monopolists of any of the waters so as to be able to make 20 or more per cent. dividends during the irrigation season.

All land it is possible for a stream of water to benefit is interested in that water, and I think has an inalienable right to it, subject to certain conditions brought about by the action of the people, which perhaps may be most practicable to accomplish through their public organizations, specially important moves to be by voting on the propositions submitted.

Said land should be able to become interested in canals at any time their owners are able to, within perhaps years after they are made, according to the ability of the owners, to pay for the interest. This will tend to increased value and improvement of the lands and reimburse the city or company that may incur expenses and responsibilities in taking charge, controlling and making said canals.

It may be some lands would not get water only alternate years, and then raise sufficient crops to keep the owners till raising another crop. It may be that surplus waters in the early portion of the season would insure some crops by one or two irrigations, thus benefitting all lands, and increasing tax receipts; it is possible. The city might take control, as proposed, of the canal, call for representation of owners of adjoining lands to agree on a plan of making the canal and for getting a future interest in it.

The city might issue bonds of small amounts, payable on or before a term of years at its option, drawing a fair interest, endeavoring to pay these bonds directly to the owners of the land benefitted, in payment for making the canal as per the agreed plan. The laborer might be able to get some of these bonds, when otherwise idle, which, being guaranteed by the city, probably would become first-class property. The bonds should not be taxable, but the lands they benefitted should be made to be, which of course would be the case. No canals for irrigation should be taxable, I think. We cannot criticize the city officials adversely for endeavoring to supply the requirements of many of their constituents with water, on the most feasible plans that seem to offer, by building and making artesian wells and a canal.

Water and cheaper fuel, or home-supplied fuel, from Coalville and Pleasant Valley mines, are perhaps the main factors of our future prosperity as a city. It may be practicable to build a towpath canal, with some locks, out of the proposed irrigation one, and bring fuel from Spanish Fork City by water, and sell at much less than present rates

for coal. There is, if practicable for such a canal, over \$500,000 a year profit now as a margin at present prices which could be enhanced by cheaper expense of moving, and curtailed likely by competition with rail. I believe this is important enough to be examined into by a committee. A short rail line would have to be built from Spanish Fork, and all the property should be controlled absolutely by the public through their representatives of counties and cities interested. Our City officials represent important interests in this respect, and, although I do not believe they should take as an example large cities with immense sources in the borrowing of money, issuing bonds, etc., I believe they are justified in doing all possible to prevent the monopoly of water and fuel in the interests of the people which may, in our peculiar position, justify, by vote, extraordinary measures.

I find I cannot get all my ideas in this necessarily short article, so adieu.
