LOCAL BRIEFS.

Dies from Appendicitis—Miss Ada Knudsen at Murray, aged 23, died yesterday, from appendicitis.

Street of Coal—Owing to shortage in supply of coal, most of the Washington school was forced to close yesterday afternoon, but only for the time being.

Pose Laid in Throat—John Clagge of American Fork is at the L. D. & S. hospital to be relieved by an operation, from a tumor which lodged in his throat. He is convalescent.

Educational Delegates—The Utah delegates to the convention at Chicago, of the National Education for the promotion of industrial education, will be H. H. Rolapp and Dr. John A. Whitson.

Object to New Drain—Property owners near the new Poplar Grove school have complained to the county attorney that the new drain there is creating a nuisance and polluting the river.

Exhibit Closed—The state board of horticulture met and formally closed up the Sacramento exhibit. The displays received back from California, have been rearranged at the chamber of commerce.

Working Fall Power—Manager Long of the Western Union has 20 operators, all he needs at present, with applications for work coming along every day. The old hands are all trying to get their jobs back.

Inquiry from Children Delegates—Educational Delegate Francis of Salt Lake, Washington, has written to Supt. Christensen of the Salt Lake public schools, asking for information as to educational methods obtaining here.

Draft Runner Denied—Runners were current yesterday, the missing commercial traveler, had communicated with his family, sending his wife a draft for \$1,000. The family deny that this is the case and decline to talk of the man's disappearance.

Bryant School Sanitary—Dr. S. J. Townsend has carefully examined the premises of the Bryant school, with reference to sanitary conditions, and found them perfectly satisfactory. He has so reported to the superintendent, who says the prevalence of contagious disease cannot be connected with the public school.

May View Remains—Friends wishing to view the body of the late Robert T. Burton, of the preceding bishopric, may do so today at the late residence of the deceased, 108 South Second and West streets, at 10 o'clock this afternoon. The funeral service will take place in the Assembly hall, Temple square at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

New Colored Pastor—The local colored Methodist church has a new pastor in Rev. John W. H. Morris who comes from South Omaha, Neb., to take the pulpit of the church under the reign of Rev. J. C. Bell. The latter's departure was due to dissatisfaction with the congregation with his business and to his suggestions as to personal remuneration in collecting funds for the new church.

Westinghouse Solvent—General Agent L. M. Cargill of the Westinghouse company in this city has received from Pittsburgh, Pa. the embargement of the Westinghouse company, which resulted in its going into the hands of a receiver. It is a transient and temporary condition, which the company will shortly be released. The concern continues to do an immense business, and is perfectly solvent.

Will Discuss Plans—The directors of the state fair will meet this week to discuss the proposed improvement of the grounds. The plans include a complete remodeling of the entrance, the increasing of the exhibition areas, the establishment of a new restaurant, the enlargement of the grand stands, and the parking of the fair grounds, which will be in general to the sense of the ornate and the beautiful.

Ready in the Spring—The concrete foundations have been laid for the Woman's building at Westminster college, which will be ready for occupancy in the spring, and at that time a start will be made on the third structure. The three buildings will make an imposing appearance from the heights. They are to be occupied by the college and the Salt Lake College, the institute, the college, disposing of its property on Second Street, to remove to Sugar House ward.

Salt Lake Song Writer—A song by Morris Rosenblatt, who is just 15 years of age, and a member of the local class of the Young Men's Christian association, has been issued from the press of the Melville Publishing company. Returns from New York—It is reported that the financial situation in New York is gradually subsiding; also that eastern people are apathetic over the tariff issue. All through the middle western states, the farms seem very prosperous with the best crop, and contention work is being pushed on the Union Pacific. The need of the country appears to be the money with which to move the rails, as money has been flowing toward the east, where people have been looking it up. E. D. CROWTHER IS KILLED AT MILNER

Old Time Salt Laker Run Over
And Dies of His Injuries.

POPULAR THROUGHOUT STATE

Played in Dramatic Association Years Ago—Also Pioneer Builder—His Family Survives Him.

The message received from Milner, Idaho, bringing the information that Edwin D. Crowther was dead, marked the demise of one of Salt Lake's old-time actors. When a youth, Crowther played with the old Salt Lake Dramatic company, with Phil. Margetta, John Lindsay and with Madame Scheller in "Lady of Lyons." His acting was vigorous and won him distinction in his city and state; he seldom went out of the state. Upon the disbandment of the association, he taught education, and some actors, famous in later years, were his students. In 1881 he married Miss Lydia Seamon in Salt Lake. She survives him.

Mr. Crowther went to Idaho three weeks ago, and while acting in his capacity of watchman, was run over by horses and trampled to death three days ago. He came to Utah in 1886 as a boy of 17 years. His cheerfulness and courageous demeanor at all times made him popular, and in making two trips across the plains with ox teams built up a large acquaintance among the early settlers. In 1881 he married Miss Lydia Seamon in Salt Lake. She survives him.

He leaves a family of eight sons and seven daughters, 48 grandchildren and 4 great-grandchildren. His sons are Edwin S. Crowther, George H. Crowther, William O. Crowther, William H. Crowther, Fred H. Crowther and Thomas H. Crowther.

Four of his daughters, Mrs. A. H. Addy, Mrs. Ida Martin, Mrs. Mamie Mills and Miss Pearl Crowther, live in Park City, Utah; two, Mrs. Doris Mills and Mrs. Kate Bart, live in Salt Lake, and one, Mrs. Ella Alberts, lives in Michigan.
