

SIX MEN WERE TAKEN OUT DEAD.

Two Died in the Hospital and Two Others Will Surely Die.

THEY PLUNGED DOWN A SHAFT

Crowd of Employees Pressed Against Elevator Gate and It Gave Way.

St. Louis, Jan. 12.—A crowd of employees pressing against the elevator gate tonight on the sixth floor of the Elevator Show company building at Eleventh and Washington avenues, with street and give way and 10 persons were plunged down the shaft. Six were taken out dead, two died at the hospital and the other two will die.

THE DEAD. Joseph Provaznik, George Rothmann, Antonia Giacomini, died at hospital. Lovens Giacomini, son. Three unidentified.

THE INJURED. Tony Kirschner, internally; will die. William Person, internally; will die. The employees had assembled at the close of work in the corridors on the different floors, waiting for the elevator to take them down. The elevator was at the seventh floor receiving passengers when those on the sixth floor, eager to get near the door and be first into the cage, began to push toward the gate.

The gate gave way just as the elevator started to descend, and 10 of the employees plunged head first down the shaft. Six were instantly killed and their bodies formed cushions which prevented the instant death of the other four.

James Johnson, the elevator operator, was taken into custody by the police pending an investigation. Johnson said the elevator gate did not break, but that it had been raised by the employees while waiting for the car to descend to the floor, and suddenly the employees in the rear of the crowd began pushing, precipitating them down the shaft. Factors Superintendent Fry corroborated Johnson's story.

ON THE Isthmus.

Report from Admiral Coghlan Show Affairs Are Unsettled.

Washington, Jan. 12.—The following was posted at the navy department today by order of the secretary: "The following cable has been received from Admiral Coghlan, dated Cebu, Jan. 12: 'Reports from Cartagena, state the entire Cartagena now about to transfer troops to Gulf of Darien. Troops are arriving at Barranquilla quite rapidly. Four thousand men now there. Being from Calcutta harbor, reports are friendly. Chief at Sardi now wears uniform of colonel of Colombian force. A large number of canoes at Sardi and Mosquito villages. No large landing of Colombian force made on the coast, merely parties of two or three in canoes. Traders in that vicinity say Indians are unfriendly to all

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strangers, allowing none to sleep ashore. No Colombian forces were seen at any time or place in Panama territory. No trail or stream which can be entered from the sea was found. Everything about the same as when the Atlanta visited there the first time, except chief having uniform. No American vessels have ever been able to buy stores from the Indians, even before Colombian forces went to Titusmati. Bancroft starts for northeast coast Tuesday morning. Castine and Mayflower follow when coaled. The Topika is just in from Bocas del Toro, with a report from the Nashville that everything is quiet and no excitement. The Nashville will remain there. When Stewart is repaired I propose to send her there also.

Mayflower returned. Found Manning Bay Indians unfriendly. Objected strongly to exploration in their territory. From Concepcion bay south to Mosquito village the Indians are friendly, and say they will not permit Colombian forces or Indians to pass them. Indians said Colombian force expected to get all canoes, and with schooners and steam launches take large force to Mandingo bay. The movements of the Bancroft, Castine and Mayflower are in consequence of directions sent by the department some days since, to use every possible effort for the pacification of the Indian tribes and to prevent as far as possible, the restlessness and uneasiness that might follow from the presence of strangers in their territory.

STREET CAR COLLISION.

One in Los Angeles Results in the Killing of One, Injuring Many.

Los Angeles, Jan. 12.—A collision between two cars on the Whittier line of the Pacific electric railroad at 10 o'clock tonight resulted in the death of one passenger and the injury of eight others, two of them seriously. The cars were practically demolished. The dead: Mrs. C. W. Priest, Whittier. The injured: J. R. Cooke, both knees broken, seriously hurt; J. J. Townsend, both legs broken, serious; Frank Platt, leg broken; R. F. Edwards, legs hurt and head cut; Mrs. W. A. Yevette, not seriously hurt; Muriel Yevette, slightly hurt; Charles Lucas, Fred L. Bendler.

MAY OFFER MEDIATION.

HAS NO MONEY FOR COLOMBIA.

Not a Dollar Will Go Out of U. S. Treasury Because Of Panama's Secession.

NOR WILL CASE GO TO HAGUE.

To Do Either of These Things Would Be to Admit the Administration Had Done Wrong.

Washington, Jan. 12.—It can be stated by authority that the administration does not contemplate paying one dollar out of the United States treasury to Colombia on account of the secession of Panama. Nor will it go before the Hague tribunal as a party to any proceedings growing out of that secession. It is said to do either of these things would be to commit the administration to an admission that it had been guilty of wronging Colombia.

On the other hand, it is again announced that the United States government stands ready to do everything in its power to bring about an amicable understanding between Colombia and Panama. It may be that Panama will consent to go before the Hague tribunal with Colombia and allow that tribunal to decide whether or not Panama should make any concessions to Colombia on account of the severance of political ties. It is certain that the United States government would look with favor upon the assumption of Panama of some responsibility to make good the heavy loss which Colombia has suffered. The government is even willing to go to the extent of guaranteeing the payments by Panama of any duty and obligation she may assume toward Colombia, and exchanges on this basis between interested parties are now in progress.

MURDERED WITH DYNAMITE.

Honolulu, Jan. 12.—G. H. Glennan, formerly of Redwood, Cal., an engineer on a plantation at Makawale, in Kauai county, was murdered on Friday night by means of a stick of dynamite, which was exploded under his bed in a tent. Japanese gamblers whom Glennan had raided are suspected of having caused his death.

CORAN EMPEROR PANIS STRICKEN.

London, Jan. 12.—The Times' Moscow correspondent says he hears that the government has claimed the services of the entire volunteer fleet. The Seoul correspondent of the Daily Mail cables a description of a state of panic which he says exists at the royal palace.

CHAS. STEWART, MINER, SUICIDES.

Holme, Ida, Jan. 12.—The body of Charles Stewart, a miner, aged about 50, was found in his cabin on Toek creek, a mile and a half from Pearl Harbor, committed suicide, shooting himself with a Winchester. The trigger was tripped by means of a string. Stewart was a pioneer of the Pearl camp. During the holidays he went on a spree and became quite intoxicated to such a degree that he was afraid to stay where he was and there was talk of having him examined as to his sanity.

HERBERT SPENCER'S WILL.

Provides for Continuation of Publication of His Works.

London, Jan. 12.—Herbert Spencer's will is a curious document. It directs that his body shall be placed in a coffin with a loose lid and cremated and the ashes buried, all without any species of religious ceremony. All the rights and properties in his books and investments are given to the trustees, Hon. Auberon Herbert, Dr. Henry Charlton Bastian, and David Duncan, with instructions to employ the yearly revenue "in resuming and continuing during each period as may be needed for furthering the cause of the existing parts of my 'Descriptive Sociology,' and the compilation and publication of the fresh parts thereof upon the plan followed in the parts already published."

Afterward all copyrights, stereotypes, etc., are to be auctioned and the proceeds divided among a number of scientific societies. The will orders that Herbert Spencer's autobiography is to be published simultaneously in Great Britain and the United States, and requests David Duncan to write a biography in one volume of moderate size.

ULTIMATUM TO CARNEGIE CO.

Youngstown, O., Jan. 14.—A final meeting of the 1200 employees of the Ohio plant of the Carnegie Steel Co. held Saturday night, at which an ultimatum will be prepared and presented to the company. Upon their acceptance or rejection depends, the next state, the question of whether they have been cut 68.23 per cent and they are unwilling to accept such an extensive reduction.

GOV. PEABODY DENOUNCED.

Denver, Colo., Jan. 13.—At the meeting of the State Federation of Labor today resolutions were adopted, with practically no opposition, denouncing the present state administration, and especially the action of Gov. Peabody in calling out the state militia and demanding the immediate withdrawal of the troops from the Cripple Creek and Telluride districts. The resolutions adopted pledge every member of organization in Colorado to vote at the next state election for only such legislative candidates as pledge themselves to oppose any movement looking to the payment by the state of the expenses incident to the maintenance of the military in the field during the present labor troubles.

FOREIGN MISSION BOARD CONFERENCE.

New York, Jan. 14.—At the eleventh annual conference of foreign mission boards of the United States and Canada, which has just opened here, representatives of more than 20 missionary organizations were present. They represent practically every foreign board in North America. The conference will conclude this afternoon. The Rev. Dr. William Ashmore, deacon of the First Baptist Church, of New York, who was presiding, as the "host" of Chinese missionaries, attracted great interest by statements which he made concerning the immortality of European and American residents in Asia. "They leave an ineffaceable mark upon Asiatic society," Dr. Ashmore said. "They are not starting in their careers of the missionaries, and declare that the uprisings of a few years ago were due to the machinations of the Christian

workers. This I declare to be pure calumny. The impurity and intolerance of men who in the sight of Asiatics are just as much Christians as are the missionaries seem to give the lie to all the missionary has to say."
