A new complaint has been sworn to by Charles Mostyn Owen "upon information any belief," charging the said Charles Kel ley with the crime of unlawful cohabi-tation, committed between October, 189 and the present time. This complaint sworn to, upon information and belief is not sufficient to justify the issuance of a warrant of arrest, but, for the purexamined the witnesses named on the complaint. The fact is that the child was born to Mrs. Sarah Wrighton on the — day of February, being about three months after the plea of guilty was accepted. The witnesses named by you on the complaint will not indice you on the complaint will not testify to any facts tending to show that the sald Kelley has held the said Sarah Wrighton out as his wife in the habit and repute of mariage since the plea of guilty was accepted, as before men-tioned. Of course, unless the evidence shows probable cause, it would be useless to go before a jury and attempt to convict.
