Together With Eleven Others Charged With Inciting a Riot During Recent Strike Trouble

For the murder of Anastacious Kovallis, who was killed by a shot from ambush at Bingham Junction May 13, five Austrians are now confined in the county jail under the charge of murder in the first degree. Eleven others, three of whom are Greeks, are charged with inciting a riot, and are admitted to bonds of \$500, although so far no bondsmen have appeared to furnish the required ball. Sixteen prisoners were taken to Bingham Junction yesterday after-neon by Chief Deputy Joe C. Sharp, assisted by Deputies Emery, Sleater, and Sperry, and in the afternoon they were arraigned before Justice of the Peace Williams. All entered pleas of not guility, and it was announced that bonds would be fixed at \$500 for those charged with riot. The date for a preliminary hearing will be an-nounced later, but it is thought that it will be some time during next week. The foreigners have retined Parley P. ## SUIT OVER LAND.

Henry Altman Accused of Doubling

Price of Lot After Agreeing to Sell.

A. H. Crabbe and C. H. Dowse have A. H. Crabbe and C. H. Dowse have filed suit in the district court against Henry Altman to compel the latter to transfer to them part of lot 6, block 49, plat A, Sait Lake City survey, as he contracted to do. It is claimed that defendant entered into an agreement for the sale of the land to plaintiffs on Dec. II. 1906, for \$4,000, and that \$200 was paid down to bind the bargain. The remainder of the purchase price was to have been paid on May 15, 1907. On that date it is alleged that defendant refused to transfer the property unless plaintiffs paid him \$9,800 for it. Suit was accordingly filed to compel him to transfer the property according to agreement. agreement.

# WATER TROUBLE AGAIN.

#### An Amended Complaint Filed by Progress Company-Asks for Title.

An amended complaint has been filed in the district court by the Pro-gress company against Salt Lake City and about 200 other defendants to setgress company against Salt Lake City and about 300 other defendants to sel-tle the controversy over the waters of Big Cottonwood creek. The action was filed some time ago to enjoin the city from diverting the water from tile creek into the Big Cottonwood condult and after a hearing on a temporary injunction was compromised for the present. The company now files an amended complaint, in which it asks that the rights of the various parties to the waters of the creek be adjudi-cated and that its title be confirmed. The defendants comprise all of the farmers in the county and all other persons or concerns who claim any interest whatever in the waters. The Continental Life Insurance & In-vestment company has filed suit in the district court against John S. Locke to recover a balance of \$42.71 and filer-est at the rate of 10 per cent per an-num on a promissory note executed by defendant on June 20, 1965.
