For Coal Shortage.—Coal dealers report that some consumers have begun storing coal preparatory to use next winter when there is expected to be another scarcity.

Another New Building.—Work has begun on the \$7,000 warehouse at Bailey & South Third West street. It will be of reinforced concrete and iron, two stories and basement.

Jewelry's Outing.—The local Jeweler's association met last night, and arranged a program for their annual outing at Lagoona, which will be held on Saturday, June 1, when an attendance of 200 people is expected.

FIVE AUSTRIANS IN COUNTY JAIL

Under Charge of Murder in First Degree for Killing Greek At Bingham.

ARRAIGNED YESTERDAY P. M.

Together With Eleven Others Charged With Inciting a Riot During Recent Strike Trouble.

For the murder of Anastasios Kovallios, who was killed by a shot from ambush at Bingham Junction May 13, five Austrians are now confined in the county jail under the charge of murder in the first degree. Eleven others, three of whom are Greeks, are charged with inciting a riot, and are admitted to bonds of \$500, although so far no bondsmen have appeared to furnish the required bail. Sixteen prisoners were taken to Bingham Junction yesterday afternoon by Chief Deputy Joe C. Sharp, assisted by Deputies Emery, Sleater, and Sperry, and in the afternoon they were arraigned before Judge of the Peace Williams. All entered pleas of not guilty, and it was announced that bonds would be fixed at \$500 for those charged with inciting a riot, and a preliminary hearing will be announced later, but it is thought that it will be some time during next week.

WATER TROUBLE AGAIN.

An Amended Complaint Filed by Progress Company—Asks for Title.

An amended complaint has been filed in the district court by the Progress company against Salt Lake City and about 300 other defendants to settle the controversy over the waters of Big Cottonwood creek. The action was filed some time ago to enjoin the city from diverting the water from the creek to the city water works, and after a hearing on a temporary injunction was compromised for the present. The company now files an amended complaint, in substance, that the rights of the various parties to the waters of the creek be adjudicated and that its title be confirmed. The defendants comprise the city, the Progress company, and all other persons or concerns who claim any interest whatever in the waters. The Progress company has filed suit in the district court against John S. Locke to recover a balance of \$12,711 and interest at the rate of 10 per cent per annum on a promissory note executed by defendant on June 20, 1905. Judgment is also asked for \$25 as attorney's fees.

LUMBER CO. SUES.

Contracting Firm and Others Made Defendants in Two Actions to Recover.

Two suits have been filed in the district court by the Sierra Nevada Lumber company to recover balances due for lumber sold to defendants. One suit is against O. J. Salsbury and wife and David Baird and is to recover a balance of \$5,243.75. The other suit is against George Canning and wife, McCormick & Gray, and J. B. Smith to recover a balance of \$3,678.82.

FOR NON-SUPPORT.

Jean M. Birdell Would Serve Bonds of Matrimony With Husband.

An action for divorce has been filed in the district court by Jean M. Birdell against Thomas M. Birdell, on the grounds of cruelty and non-support. They were married on Feb. 27, 1905, and it is alleged that on July 5 of the same year plaintiff was compelled to leave defendant's home and to seek refuge in the home of her mother, and that she has since been unable to support her. She also asks for the restoration of her maiden name, Jean Dickinson.

CASE THROWN OUT.

After waiting some time for the attorneys and the interested parties in the action to appear and try the case, Judge Ritchie has ordered the case of George Tucker against the Colorado Southern Railway company stricken from the calendar. The action was set for trial today, and defendant's attorneys had appeared, but the plaintiff's attorneys failed to appear. The case was thrown out for want of due diligence.

FEDERAL COURT.

In the case of the Mammoth Mining company against the Grand Central Mining company et al, Judge Marshall has denied the motion for a rehearing. Judge Marshall has remanded to the lower court the case of Brigham City versus the Boxelder Light & Power company.

The report of the receiver for the Annie Laurie Mining company was approved by Judge Marshall, and the receiver was discharged. The appointment grew out of the suit filed by the estate of Annie Laurie. The motion for a rehearing in the case of Elsie Box, a bankrupt, has been denied by Judge Marshall in the federal court. Frank H. Leib, against whom a petition had been filed in the federal court asking that he be declared an involuntary bankrupt, has been so adjudicated by Judge Marshall.

COURT NOTES.

M. H. Walker and F. H. Bascom have filed suit in the district court against Elizabeth C. Connelly and the heirs of the estate of Richard Golightly, deceased, to quiet title to part of lot 6, block 83, plat A, Salt Lake City survey. Oliver Henson has filed a petition in the probate division of the district court asking for letters of administration of the estate of Mary S. Henson, who died on May 10, 1907, leaving an estate valued at \$2,500. There are eight heirs mentioned in the petition.

Judge Morse has entered an order in the district court for letters of administration of the estate of Benjamin F. Bates, requiring the defendant to pay plaintiff \$45 per month alimony pending the trial.
