## SESSION OF CITY COUNCIL

Proposition to Revise City Ordinances—Viaduct Franchise Accepted by R. R. People.

## AFAIRS OF WEBER COUNTY.

Permission Granted Light and Power Company to Raise Dam in Ogden Canyon—Bids for Public Bldg.

Ogden, Feb. 18.—At last night's session of the city council an ordinance passed two readings providing for a complete revision of the city ordinances, to be compiled by some one who will be named later and who will work in conjunction with five members of the council. It is estimated that the cost of this work will be in the neighborhood of \$500.

The street committee reported that a conference had been had with the railroad people in regard to building a viaduct along the Ogden river in the Glasgow addition and recommended that the work be started at once. The cost of the project was given at \$1,600, to be divided equally between the city and the company. The recommendation was adopted.

The motion of Councilman H. E. Peery was adopted providing for an investigation into the receipts and expenditures of the city during the past few administrations, in order to ascertain just what way the city is drifting financially. This action grew out of a statement recently published by the Glasman paper in which all but Glasman's own administration were criticised for the condition in which they left the city treasury. Mr. Peery intends to present to the people the facts and is of the opinion that the financial end was not exactly as represented.

The sanitary committee reported \$1 cases of contagion under quarantine. Most of these are said to be measles.

According to an opinion presented to the city council the eight-hour law passed by the legislature does not apply to the police department of Ogden. This opinion was asked for by Councilman Austin a week ago, when the matter of retraction was up for discussion.

The acceptance of the franchise for the building of the Twenty-fourth street viaduct by the railroad people was received by the city recorder yesterday and placed before the council.

The letter from General Manager Bancroft states that the plans for the structure are complete, and that work will be commenced within a short time.

## TO RAISE POWER DAM.

County Board Approves Plans of Light Company to Store More Water.

Ogden, Feb. 18.—The Weber county board of commissioners at its regular meeting granted the petition of the Utah Light & Railway company to raise its dam in Ogden canyon several feet and to change the driveway a little, the work to be done under the direction of County Surveyor Craven, and subject to the approval of the board. By the raising of the dam the power company will be able to store up a great deal more water, and increase its power capacity.

Commissioner Madison reported that reports furnished him from the health officers in the districts where the hog plague was killing so many swine that the conditions have materially improved and while a few hogs are dying from the disease, the percentage is low as compared with two weeks ago.

A report from Health Officer Parker of Hooper is to the effect that the smallpox, which was troubling the people of the district, has been entirely all a thing of the past and the places have been thoroughly disinfected.

Verseer of Poor Joseph Stanford reported having sent Mrs. Benjamin Bush to the county infirmary and William Parson to the hospital for treatment.

## FUNERAL OF MRS. JNO. L. JONES.

The high esteem in which Mrs. Nancy J. Jones, wife of John L. Jones, who died Friday of chronic kidney troubles, aged 42 years, was evidenced yesterday by the large attendance at the funeral services and the wealth of beautiful floral tributes. The services were held at the Wilson ward meetinghouse, Bishop Frank W. Stratford presiding. Appropriate music was furnished by the ward choir. George Bingham sang "O My Father." Elders John V. Bluth and Fred W. Chambers, who had made the acquaintance of the deceased in the mission field in Tennessee spoke of her devotion to the gospel and her kindness to the elders. President C. F. Middleton and Bishop Stratford spoke many words of comfort. Burial was made in the Ogden city cemetery.

## BURIAL OF FRANK ATKINSON.

The last sad rites over the mortal remains of Brigham Atkinson, who died Friday, aged 20 years, were performed yesterday afternoon, and his body laid to rest in the family burial plot in the Ogden City cemetery. Impressive services over his remains were held at Larkin & Son's funeral chapel, Elders Paul Ziegenhild presiding. Members of the Third ward choir furnished the music. Comforting talk on the power of the resurrection and the blessing of a pure upright life were made by Bishop James W. Waterspoon and Elder Alma J. Larkin.

DEATH FOLLOWS MEASLES.

Two Children Succumb to Malady, Which is Epidemic.

Draper, Salt Lake Co., Feb. 17.—Two deaths have occurred here during the past week. The 16-month-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Walbeck died Feb. 16, of pneumonia, and the 6-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Asa Gustafson died Feb. 15, of bronchitis. Both were first taken sick with the measles, which resulted seriously.

For the past two weeks an epidemic of measles has been raging here, there being about 50 cases now.

LOSE THREE CHILDREN

In One Week Through Malignant Measles—Other Cases.

Lewiston, Cache Co., Feb. 15.—Funeral services over the remains of Yoda, the 12-year-old daughter of Philo Ruston, were held from the meetinghouse at 1 o'clock today. Measles and pneumonia were the cause of her death. Word was received while the services were being held of the death of another member of the family. The sadness of the occasion was made more so by the fact that on last Saturday, Feb. 8, the family were called to lay away a little 8-year-old daughter. There are still three of the children who are dangerously ill from the same malady. The health of the family is extended to this sore trial.

There are a number of families in the ward who are under quarantine, and the doctors claim that this type of measles is more difficult to handle than diphtheria.

Henrietta Allen is very ill from general diphtheria and she has been full of life and vitality for one who has seen 86 summers, and up to the time of her present illness has been able to keep house without assistance.

The weather is ideal for the time of the year, the only fear is that there will not be sufficient snow to insure a good water supply for irrigation purposes.

There has been no frost here since the winter, excepting the night of Jan. 21, when the thermometer registered 19 degrees below zero.
