

TELEGRAPHIC. WRATH OF ELEMENTS

Ferocious and Cyclonic Destroy Life and Property.

A GREAT STORM IS PREDICTED.

Chicago the Center—6,000 Lives Lost in an Earthquake—Verona and Chicago.

LANDED, Kans., June 19.—A tornado swept through the northwest part of this county, and near a village eighteen miles west of here, was almost completely wiped out of existence, two grain elevators and every house being swept away.

A mile north of Roselle, the farm house of Ed Chasterton was destroyed, and one side blown in. Three miles northwest of here and outhouses were demolished.

At Burdett a building escaped uninjured. James Christian, a farmer, had his house totally crushed and his family was seriously injured by being flying from a demolished house.

At one place the storm did considerable damage to buildings and crops.

THE CYCLONE IN FRANCE

PARIS, June 19.—The Gaulois today says that twenty persons were killed and nearly thirty injured in the cyclone which swept over the villages of Hissou, Combaux and Assier yesterday.

SIX THOUSAND LIVES LOST

SINIA, June 19.—It is announced today that over six thousand lives have been lost by the earthquake disturbances which have recently visited the province of Assam.

A message of condolence has been received from Queen Victoria.

WIND AND RAIN

MONTREAL, June 19.—The streets of this city were flooded by a severe storm of rain and wind which has done much damage to all coast towns. No lives are reported lost.

STORM IN THE CHANNEL

DUNDEE, England, June 19.—The storm in the Channel continued. A large steamer is reported to have been driven ashore and the crew rescued.

DESTRUCTION PREDICTED

CHICAGO, June 19.—The United States weather bureau has announced that a storm of this nature is favorable for a destructive storm in the region of which Chicago is the center. The storm may strike any point in the unincorporated territory and may inflict damage in any locality from Madison, Wis., to Indianapolis, Ind., and between the Gulf of Mexico and the Atlantic Ocean.

The government barometer here at 2 p.m. today indicates a falling bar. This is a lower point than was recorded at St. Louis just previous to the disastrous cyclone of last year. The record at St. Louis, just as the storm broke, was 30.35.

FISHING BOATS LOST

ANTWERP, June 19.—Seven fishing boats of the Belgian coast have been lost with all their crews, and several fishing boats have been lost off Northveigen, on the Dutch coast.

AGAINST BURETINE

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FATAL WINDSTORMS.

Cyclone in France Causes Loss of Life and Property.

A FAIR LITERALLY DESTRUCTION.

Twenty Persons Killed and Ninety Injured—Destructive Onslaught in Illinois.

PARIS, June 19.—A cyclone swept over the village of Hissou, Combaux and Assier, near this city, this afternoon. Houses collapsed, trees were torn up, telegraph wires broken, several people injured, and much general damage done.

At the time the cyclone struck Assier a fair was in progress. Everything was literally demolished. Two hundred trees were uprooted. The roof of the town hall was blown off, a tall chimney was killed and the boiler exploded, killing several persons and injuring fifteen.

It is reported that five persons were killed in Assier.

In every direction houses and other buildings were more or less seriously damaged.

It is estimated that throughout the district at least twenty persons were killed and about fifty injured.

The whole section at Combaux, about five miles northwest of Paris, was a scene of utter desolation.
