This statement has since been verified by the letter from Mr. Walcott, director of the United States geological survey, which was published in your issue of the 25th inst., in which he practically endorses the statement of the arid land commission, that, 'no more worthy place or people can be found than is here af-forded for the successful application and operation of the reclamation law, and says that, 'it is proposed to undertake field work on the project referred to and ascertain all of the physical features; at the same time it is understood that the people interested are getting together in order to co-operate with the reclamation service in making the undertaking a great success.'

where she must secure a larger supply of water or she will cease to grow and her business interests must suffer. There are countless acres of arid land in this and surrounding counties which would increase immeasurably in value by irrigation, but why, we ask, should the present water owner relinquish what is already his and then buy it back at the price asked of him who sacrifices nothing?

Why should there be saddled upon his shoulders an enormous debt of one million dollars for the benefit of business man of Salt Lake City and the speculator?

Why should he mortgage his little home that the dry farmer and the land grabber (many prominent and wealthy residents of Salt Lake City own immense tracts of arid land in Salt Lake and Tooele counties) may have water to irrigate the thirsty soil and thus gain a fortune by the other's sacrifice? Why should he give away his inherit-ance for a mess of pottage?

MAKE HASTE SIOWLY.

All that the United States is doing is to offer to lend them money that is at the disposal of the department of the interior, under the act of Congress. They are going to clared: act of Congress. They are going to get the loan of this money without interest, if the officers selected by the department can see that the plan contemplated is a sound one. The difficulty at present in the way is to ascertain what the precise rights are that the

farmers are entitled to. In the ab-sence of any measurements it is im-possible to decide exactly what these are. The government says: Settle it among yourselves, and then we'll do We, the members of the business. committee, are trying to help them to settle the matter."

Mr. Doremus does not think the project will be feasible on a 60 second fest basis. Moreover, "If the project were to be pushed through, there would be 1,000 second feet of water to be dis-posed of. The more that is set aside, the less there will be to be sold, and correspondingly, the greater will be the expense to those who wish to buy."

Colonel Holmes says, "This question of primary rights must be settled before we can go any further in the mat-But it is by no means the only ter. knotty problem that has to be dealt with; it is only the first. There seems to be a general idea that the committee, of which I am president, is representing the government. As a matter of fact, we are representing the farmers. The South Jordan Canal company has not the largest canal. A certain amount of the land that is watered by it, how-ever, does not require so much as the other land, as it benefits by the other

FIVE COUNTIES IN IT.

"It seems to me that the people residing in the counties of Cache, Boxelder, Weber, Falt Lake and Utah do not fully appreciate the importance of this great enterprise and the benefits which would result to them and the state at large by reason of its consummation. It is well known that only about onethird, a little over 300,000 acres of the lands lying within these counties, which are susceptible of irrigation and cultivation, have a water right, and yet all the available water has been utilized. To secure a right for the remaining 700,000 acres will require the expendi-

ture of large sums of money, and it would be exceedingly difficult, if not impossible, to obtain the necessary means from the parties inter-ested to prosecute such a preliminary examination as would demonstrate the feasibility of any project. When it is remembered that the government is willing to do all this work without the advancement of a dollar by the people or the state, until the feasibility of the project has been determined and the people have had an opportunity of decidding for themselves whether or not they desire the water upon such terms as will reimburse the government, its magnanimity is appar-ent, and I do not see why anyone should hesitate about having the pre liminary work done, inasmuch as it entails no responsibility or expense upon

them.

"The people should remember that a great many projects are being present-ed from all parts of the arid region, for consideration under the reclamation law, and that the fund is not sufficient to meet one-half of the demands which are made upon it. Although Utah has the advantage of other states in having preliminary work already commenced on her project, the success of the enterprise depends entirely upon the in terest which is manifested by the peo ple and the action which they may take to meet the requirements of the law and enable the government to make a success of the undertaking. Under the circumstances, it would seem that ev ery citizen desiring the welfare and development of the state, should use his influence to forward this great en. terprise, which would, in the language of one of the government officials, con vert Salt Lake, Utah and Cache val leys into 'a perfect paradise.' "
