

LIGHT ON LIFE INSURANCE WAYS

To be a Senator at Albany Was Worth Anywhere from \$50,000 to \$100,000.

POLITICIANS BLEED COMPANIES

General Agent of Penn Mutual Tells How His Company Had to Contribute.

Washington, May 21.—Some additional inside light was thrown on insurance methods in New York today by Representative James A. Goulden of that state, before the house committee on the judiciary considering the Ames bill for the regulation of insurance in the District of Columbia. Mr. Goulden is general agent of the Penn Mutual Life Insurance company in New York.

"Why," he said, "it was a well-known fact that to be a senator at Albany was worth anywhere from \$50,000 to \$100,000 a year, and that the money came largely from the insurance companies. This is no secret. Every New York man knows it. I know it. I know it well."

Touching on the subject of campaign contributions, Mr. Goulden said that his company had been forced into giving \$10,000 to a national campaign committee in 1896. He did not say which campaign committee received the money, but remarked that the same thing was done in 1900 and 1904, but without success, owing to the firm stand taken by Mr. Plimpton of Massachusetts, one of the directors, who declared that every director who voted for such contributions would be held personally liable for the amount.

The hearings on the Ames bill closed with the testimony of Mr. Goulden.

BLISS BEFORE GRAND JURY.

New York, May 21.—Cornelius N. Bliss, treasurer of the National Republican committee, testified as a witness today before the special grand jury which was drawn at the instance of District Attorney Jerome to investigate life insurance matters.

At the hearing before the Armstrong committee Mr. Bliss testified as a witness to the Mutual to the national campaign fund, and it is supposed that he was questioned today along the same lines. District Attorney Jerome refused absolutely to discuss Mr. Bliss' testimony today. The other witnesses examined by the special grand jury were Charles F. Peller and Charles O. Greisinger, auditor and assistant auditor respectively of the Mutual, and William C. Edwards, treasurer of the Guaranty Trust company, an auxiliary or subsidiary organization of the Mutual.

MANY INDICTMENTS FOR LAND FRAUDS.

Omaha, May 21.—The federal grand jury today returned a number of indictments in connection with the alleged land frauds in Cherry county and elsewhere in Nebraska. The charges are conspiracy to obtain government land through fraudulent entries, subornation of perjury and similar offenses.

Those against whom indictments were reported are A. R. and A. M. Modest, president and vice president, and H. C. Dale, cashier, of the Stockman's bank of Rushville, and William Smoot, government farmer at the Pine Ridge agency, who are alleged to have secured 2,000 acres illegally; Earl Comstock of Los Angeles, brother of William G. Comstock of the firm of Richards & Comstock; E. C. Harris, an official of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient railway, and Reuben Hudgill, a retired farmer of New Virginia, Ia. Several of the persons indicted were in court when the jury report was read, ready to give bond.

THEATRICAL NAT'L BANK.

Outcome of Merger of Various Theatrical Concerns.

Chicago, May 21.—The Theatrical National bank is the name to be given to a new financial institution which will be opened next month in this city. The new bank is an outcome of the large theatrical merger recently effected by Klaw & Erlinger, B. F. Keith and the managers of the Western Vaudeville Managers' association, and will be financed by the merger.

The capital stock will be \$1,000,000 all paid up, and the business of the institution will come largely from theatrical managers and professional people. The business of the theaters interested amounting to \$2,000,000 a month.

Arrangements have also been made by the merger, according to Charles E. Kohl of this city, to establish a legal department and a railroad department, with headquarters in this city. The latter department will control the entire transportation of the theatrical companies embraced in the scope of the merger, amounting to millions of dollars annually.

CHINESE REFUGEES.

Chinese Minister Visits Them and Has no Complaint to Make.

Oakland, Cal., May 21.—Sir Cheung Laiing Cheung, Chinese minister to the United States, has arrived here to ascertain the condition of his countrymen who suffered loss in the San Francisco disaster. In company with Dr. Edwards, Chinese Minister, he visited the different Chinese refugee camps today. He said: "I am satisfied that our people are well treated by the relief committees. I was highly pleased to learn from personal observation and investigation that the lot of Chinese refugees is no harder than that of the white people, and that the relief organizations are treating all the deserving needy alike, irrespective of nationality."

Minister Cheng will remain here until Friday next, when he will return to Washington.

A BALLOON VOYAGE.

Dr. Thomas and Charles Levee Start On a Three Days' Trip.

New York, May 21.—Provided for an air voyage of three days, the balloon Niverville, managed by the aviator, Dr. Julian P. Thomas of the Aero club, and Charles Levee, French aviator, ascended this afternoon from Fort Morris on the Harlem river. Dr. Thomas announced that the trip was intended as an endurance test and that he would keep in the air as long as his gas and food held out. The balloon, which has just been completed, has a capacity of 20,000 cubic feet.

The ascent was made at 4:45 in a light westerly wind and the balloon rose straight into the air about 2,000 feet and drifted slowly south until it was over Central park, where a shift in the wind sent it driving rapidly northward, passing over Tarrytown and Yonkers. When last seen at dusk the balloon was over Sing Sing, still traveling north.

THE OSAGE INDIANS.

House Passes a Bill Segregating Their Lands.

Washington, May 21.—Outside of statehood, possibly the most important legislation in which the Osage Indians of Indian Territory are interested passed the house of representatives today. This is the bill segregating the lands of the Osage Indians, which was introduced by Representative McCullough of Oklahoma, and who had charge of the measure on the floor, assisted by Mr. Curtis and Mr. Murdock of Kansas.

For years efforts have been made to segregate the lands of these Indians, but the Indians themselves have been dilatory and it was not until recently that the bill which passed today was approved by them. The Osage Indians, about 1,300 in number, have \$8,000,000 in the treasury. The bill which passed today segregates the fund to individuals, and will give them \$50 each per quarter as interest, and in 25 years they are to receive the principal.

In addition the lands of the Osages, about 14,000 acres, are to be allotted, each will give each member of the tribe about 100 acres, exclusive of the coal and oil lands, which are not to be allotted under the provisions of the bill for 25 years.

Some of the richest coal and oil lands in the country are included within the Osage reservation according to a statement made by Mr. Zener (Ind.), who succeeded in attaching an amendment to the bill that the Indians must ratify the act before Dec. 1, 1906, by a majority of the adult male members of the tribe at either a general election or at a special election called for the purpose.

RICHARD T. GREEN DECORATED.

Washington, May 21.—Richard T. Green, former commercial agent at Vladivostok, has received, through the state department, the order of the Double Dragon, third class, from the Chinese emperor for services rendered during the war. The decoration was withheld until by reason of his retirement from the government service Mr. Green was able to accept it. Under the same conditions a similar decoration has been awarded to Dr. Gracie, ex-consul at Amoy, and John Goodnow, ex-consul at Shanghai.

HENRY L. DOHERTY WOULDN'T TESTIFY

Regarding Alleged Bogus Tax Receipts Used in the Denver City Election.

JUDGE COMMITTED HIM TO JAIL

Released by State Supreme Court Which Restrained Judge Johnson From Proceeding.

Denver, May 21.—Henry L. Doherty, president of the Denver Gas & Electric company, appeared in Dist. Judge J. Frank Johnson's court at 5 o'clock and was called upon to testify as to what he knew regarding the matter of the alleged bogus tax receipts used in the election. On the advice of his attorney, Joel F. Valle, he refused to testify, and even refused to be sworn.

Judge Johnson informed Mr. Doherty that he would either have to testify or be committed to jail for his refusal. After consulting with his attorney, Mr. Doherty announced that he would not testify.

Judge Johnson ordered Mr. Doherty committed to jail. Soon after Mr. Doherty's commitment, on application of attorneys representing the election commission, a temporary order was issued by the supreme court restraining Dist. Judge Johnson from proceeding further with his investigation of the vote on franchises at last week's election until Monday next, when he must show cause why he should not be permanently restrained. Subsequently, the supreme court ordered that Mr. Doherty be released in bonds of \$500. The order was based on an application for a writ of habeas corpus.

Mr. Doherty was immediately given his liberty. During the day several employees of the Denver Gas & Electric company were put on the stand in Judge Johnson's court and questioned as to the ownership of property for which tax receipts were alleged to have been voted. Several admitted that they had only owned the property for a day or two prior to election day, and that it had been purchased on contracts for long time payments. Some of the witnesses could not give a clear description of the lots, and admitted that a high official of the Denver Gas & Electric company acted as their agent. Other witnesses declined to answer certain questions on advice of counsel that their replies might incriminate them.

Attorneys for the Honest Election league, which is back of the investigation, had succeeded during the afternoon in having records of the city treasurer's office brought into court for the purpose of showing that money was paid for taxes by check of certain corporations on property standing in the names of employees. The sitting of the court was to have been resumed at 7 o'clock tonight, but all proceedings were stopped by the supreme court's injunction.

BIG FIRE IN ALABAMA.

Dothan, Ala., May 21.—Fire at Abbeyville, Ala., last night destroyed the business section of the town. Loss, \$100,000.
