# SHOWS ITS LINE OF DEFENSE.

Maoager Lippman Claims Irresponsibillity and Offending Reporter Pleads Justification for Attacks Made.

The answers of defendants in the 1156,000 libel suit brought by Supt. W. R. Jones, Jr., of the county infirmary, against the Salt Lake Tribune Publishing company, Joseph Lippman, its manager, and Frank I. Sefrit, the reporter who wrote the articles over which the action arose, have been filed In the district court by Attys. Powers and Marioneaux, who represent the defendants. Manager Lippman in his answer claims that he is not responsible for the publication of the articles referred to, while Frank I. Sefrit in his

ble for the publication of the forma-referred to, while Frank I. Sefrit in bis separate answers admy that the wrote the articles and pleads justification. All three answers deny that the ar-ticles complained of were libelous or defamatory and allege on the contrary that they were true. The answer of the Trioune company follows: I.
