That the exact cause might be learned of the death of Robert E. Williams, ed of the death of Robert E. Williams, formerly a teacher in the public schools who died Tuesday, a post mortem exam-ination was made yesterday by Drs. C. A. Wherry, W. H. Hinton and Ezra-Rich. The decision of the physicians was that the deceased, although he had been suffering from typhoid fever, had nevertheless died as the result of polsoning, and their opinion was that the polson was ptomaine. They believe it was contained in some canned food. t was contained in some canned food. There were also traces of arsenic and the physicians' opinion was that this might have been contained in the tin-ned food or might have been taken with water drunk at the mine where Mr. Williams had been working. There was no suspicion that the poison, whatever it was, was taken in other than an ac-tidental manner. cidental manner.
