Louisville, 11.—The official vote of this county shows that Webb is elected county clerk over Egthoff by 43 majority. The total vote was 19,745. Returns from the State come in slowly, and there has nothing developed which would tend to break the prediction made a week ago, namely, that the democrats would elect Henry, clerk of the Appellate Court, by 3,500 majority.

Washington, 11.—Erastus Bond was to-day appointed timber agent for California. The appointment was made at the instance of Senator Miller and Representative Page.

Horace Haynes was yesterday commissioned postmaster at Dunnegan, Cal.

GALVESTON, 11.—There seems to be a panic of the yellow fever in Matamoras, and dispatches from there regarding the number of cases are exaggerated and contradictory. According to one report the number of cases on the 9th was 50. A later dispatch reduces the number, for the same day, to 40, but that was a large increase. The daily average deaths for the week previous to the 9th were only 13. There are only about 50 cases of yellow fever at Brownsville at present but an epidemic is feared. Fort Brown is in strict quarantine, the Commander being directed not to move his troops. A relief committee has been formed and \$4,200 subscribed.

Brownsville, Texas, 11.—There are 20 new cases of yellow fever to-day. The fever in Matamoras is *status quo*—about 500 cases, with but two deaths in the last 24 hours. The weather is very favorable. There are 5 cases of fever 7 miles up the river, at Cortin's ranch. All mail communication has been stopped.

PITTSBURG, 11.—Another slight skirmish occurred at Camy Hill mines this morning. Colored non-union men are being imported.

Col. C. Clowry, general superintendent of the Western Union Telegraph Company, has received official notification from J. J. Dickey, division superintendent at Omaha, that all the striking operators at Denver had made application to be taken back at their old salaries, and that but two or three had been reinstated, as their places had already been filled and the company had all the force required.

Cohoes, N. Y., 11.—As a result of the mass meeting last night the executive committee of the Harmony Mills "stay out" claim a decrease of 23 in the working force and promise that more will quit to-day. A decisive struggle will be made Monday.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., 11.—In Clay County, near the Missouri line, on Wednesday, a farmer named Neal Harris took a pistol and a double-barreled shot gun, and calling his little son, he went ostensibly to hunt. His wife prevented her little girl from following, and fearing something wrong she started after them. Harris saw her, and placing the muzzle of the gun against the boy's breast, fired and killed him. He then fired at but missed his daughter, and immediately pointed the muzzle of the pistol at his own temple, fired and fell dead at his wife's feet. Harris had for some time acted strangely but his insanity was never suspected before the tragedy.

Newburg, N. Y., 11.—Mike Cassidy, gang boss, and one Italian, were killed by a premature explosion on the East Shore road, and another Italian was injured.

Washington Court House, O., 11.—This morning there was a collision between a freight and passenger train on the Ohio Southern road at Carroll's Crossing. Miss W. Carr was killed and several persons in the caboose of the freight train were severely injured.

Dallas, Texas, 11.—A family feud in Denton County ended in blood last night. A farmer named Green was mortally wounded by a son named Steele, on account of Steele's second marriage. Green killed his assailant. A brother of each of the combatants fought, and the second Steele it is thought cannot survive his wounds.

Whitehall, N. Y., 11.—A south-bound train for Lake George came in collision with an extra engine at Putnam this morning. Both engines were wrecked and the baggage and drawing room cars went down the bank. No one was killed.

oribadly injured in the passenger train. Leonard, engineer of the extra engine was killed.

Palestine, Texas, 11.—This afternoon Chess Thomas, colored, was hanged for the murder at Houston, of McMeans in March, 1881. He had an unflinching demeanor throughout and offered up a prayer for his friends and enemies and with an unflinching voice sang, "There is a light in the valley for me." He then nodded to the sheriff and the trap was sprung. Thomas was a bad citizen and had killed four men during his residence in Palestine.

FISHERTON, 11.—Tote Myllis, Edward Myllis, Jno. Hughsons and Wm. Widdom were drowned in Brimstir lake last evening by the upsetting of a boat.

SAN FRANCISCO, 11.—A Spokane Falls, A. T., special says: A fire last night destroyed over \$40,000 worth of property, partially insured. Several men were very severely burned.

A Shasta dispatch says: Forest fires were all around town last night, and nearly all the citizens were out fighting to keep the flames from the village. Communication between Shasta and Redding is cut off. Several residences in the outskirts, and a number of vine-yards and orchards are destroyed.

DETROIT, 11.—N. B. Hayes' sawmill at Muir, operated by Hays, Packard & Co., burned this morning. Loss, \$15,000; insured for \$6,000. It will be immediately rebuilt.

#### FOREIGN.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 10.—Following is the text of the proclamation communicated to the conference to-day:

Arabi Pasha, having the second time transgressed the law by taking the authority which does not belong to him, and having presumed upon men and vessels belonging to an old and tried friend and ally of Turkey, is for these misdeeds proclaimed a rebel together with his adherents. Be it known to all that obedience is due solely to the Khedive, who is the representative of the Sultan.

Lord Dufferin submitted to Said Pasha a draft of the military convention proposed by Great Britain. The Duke of Connaught in an interview with the Khedive, conveyed a verbal message from Queen Victoria, expressing deep sympathy and best wishes for the Khedive and Egypt.

A council proposed of Admiral Seymour and the leading military authorities here have been sitting on board of the *Helicon* to investigate the effects of the bombardment of the forts. The evidence of naval and military officers is that masonry is useless against modern guns but that earthworks turn every shot. A council of war was also held at which the Duke of Connaught was present.

A Circassian who passed through Arabi Pasha's camps states that one colonel, one captain, one subaltern and 76 men were killed on the rebel side in the engagement on Saturday.

He confirms the report of Arabi's bad health. He says 25 battalions and eleven batteries are posted along the canal between Kafr El Dwar and the advanced outposts.

An Egyptian trooper of the Khedive's guard was taken prisoner while attempting to cross the Ramleh lines, and a paper in Arabic was found on him. The probability is that he was making for Arabi's camp.

While Mrs. Stone was waiting for the train, Yakaub Pasha expressed a regret that Gen. Stone had cast his lot with the English. He begged Mrs. Stone to tell her husband that the Egyptian army would show how greatly it had profited by the 12 years instruction it had received from him.

It is reported the enemy will evacuate the works opposite the Ramleh positions, and consequently there will be no attack for the present.

London, 10.—In the Commons to-day Gladstone stated that Admiral Seymour has given the Khedive distinct assurances relative to the intentions of the government. The indefinite occupation of Egypt, was contemplated. The ultimate condition of Egypt could not be settled by any one power.

Berlin, 10.—The *Tribune* says: Russia has assured the Porte she has not instigated any agitation in Bulgaria and Roumelia, as she has no intention to increase the embarrassment caused by England.

Malta, 10.—One hundred and twenty-four volunteer artillery and

460 drivers embarked to-day on the troop ship *Humbert* for Egypt. The transport *Holland*, with the Household cavalry on board, and the transport *Thalia* have arrived.

Alexandria, 10.—Two of Arabi Pasha's spies have been captured. The troops will henceforth be supplied with water from condensers.

Cartwright, Acting British Consul General, in view of the difficulty of obtaining water, has sent a circular to the foreign consuls asking them to inform their respective governments of the great importance of preventing an increase in the number of arrivals here.

Arabi Pasha has mounted four new guns in his first line of entrenchments.

The Khedive has every confidence in the people. He has announced the departure of Dervish Pasha on board the Ottoman ship *Izzedien*, with a small force of troops.

The Duke of Connaught inspected the batteries of the forts.

Constantinople, 10.—At to-day's sitting of the conference the British ambassador announced his assent to the proposal of Count Corti, Italian ambassador, for temporary international protection of the Suez Canal. He repeated the declaration that the landing of Turkish troops in Egypt must be preceded by a proclamation against Arabi and at the conclusion of the convention with England the conference will take no cognizance of the Anglo-Turkish military convention.

Nellidoff has arrived to take charge of the Russian embassy.

Souda Bay, 10.—A Turkish transport with artillery arrived here to-day.

Portsmouth, 10.—The transport *Asiaton* sailed for Egypt with 178 men and a battery of artillery.

Gibraltar, 10.—The transport *Copella*, with the Duke of Teck on board, and the transport *Marathon* passed here on the way to Egypt.

OTTAWA, Canada, 10.—It is announced that \$5,500,000 of the \$10,000,000 Pacific Railway bonds have been taken up. The Duke of Manchester's company took \$5,000,000, \$380,000 were taken up in Toronto, and the remaining \$3,140,000 were disposed of in Canada.

MONTREAL, 10.—J. T. Hunter, notary, is a defaulter to the amount of \$100,000. He was appointed six years ago to manage the estate of the late Charles Phillips.

HAVANA, 10.—Advices from Soglia report the destruction of the corn crop owing to the extreme drouth.

The president of the Central Board of Agriculture of the Republic of Columbia writes to the Captain General warning him to take effective measures to prevent the larvae and locusts devastating that republic being introduced into Cuba by vessels carrying cattle to the island, recommended that cattle on vessels be fed with hay only. He thought the locusts would soon invade the United States after reaching Cuba.

PARIS, 10.—It is stated that the condition of Tripoli is alarming to Europeans. El Hadje, a Mohammedan has returned to Tripoli from Constantinople, and announced that the Port, after settling affairs in Egypt, intends to raise an army to drive the French out of Tunis.

Natives talk of a massacre of Christians.

SOFFA, 10.—Eastern Bulgaria, as far as the river Yanta, is proclaimed in a state of siege in consequence of the prevalence of brigandage.

Reports are current that Prince Alexander approved a new electoral law to be introduced in the Council of State.

HALIFAX, 10.—The army worm is reported in various sections of the Province.

DETROIT, 10.—The Erie & Chicago Car Company, which makes a business of furnishing cars to railroads, to-day levied on the ferry transportation, and a lot of other property of the Great Western Railroad, of Canada, to satisfy claims for \$740,000. The result was a suspension of traffic for a time, but trains are being transferred by another boat now.

PORT SAID, 11.—The transport *Nyauza* has arrived.

Vienna, 11.—The Turkish Consul at Bombay has been ordered to give an explanation to the Ulemas of India respecting the action of the Porte in regard to Turkish troops to co-operate with the British in Egypt, which has produced a great sensation among Mahomedans in India.

Chatham, 11.—The second battalion of the Royal Irish foot, 775 strong, has left for Egypt. Great enthusiasm was manifested on their departure. This completes the departure of troops from Chatham.

The dispatch of men from Southampton is also finished for the present. A squadron of the Household Cavalry has been ordered to Cyprus to form a depot from which to forward men to the front. The second army corps will be brought to its full strength in readiness to support the corps already abroad if necessary.

PARIS, 11.—Official returns of the census of France show a population of 37,672,048.

LONDON, 11.—The Czar of Russia has dispensed with his escort while driving and walking.

BERLIN, 11.—Herren Bebbel, Liebknecht and Hosenclever, socialists, were condemned by the Leipzig court to two months imprisonment for excessive abuse and insult to the Federal Council. Liebknecht and Hosenclever are members of the German Reichstag.

ALEXANDRIA, 11.—Captain Ewart has made a plucky reconnaissance from Fort Meks. He started at 1 o'clock in the morning accompanied by an interpreter, and by daybreak he had ridden 10 miles into the country. He ascertained beyond a doubt that there was no truth in the report of the presence of large bodies of the enemy in the direction in which he rode.

The formation of a new ministry will probably be announced to-day, with Cherif Pasha as prime minister. Most of the present ministers, with the exception of Ragheb Pasha, have remained in office.

Suleman Pasha will take the portfolio of the minister of education and Sherea Pasha minister of religion. They are both partisans of Arabi Pasha.

It is stated that Arabi Pasha has executed the governor of Behria.

The Scots Guards will land on Saturday and go into camp at Ramleh.

The council of war to-day decided not to change the command of the forces, Major General Allison therefore retains his position.

The Duke of Connaught and Prince Louis of Battenburg inspected Arabi Pasha's position to-day. The Duke also visited the wounded of last Saturday's engagement.

Arabi Pasha having constructed within 5,000 yards of Ramleh a formidable redoubt and embankment 30 feet high, her Majesty's ship *Superb* fired shells at the work to-day, four of which burst in close proximity to the men engaged in construction. Rear Admiral Hoskins has returned to Port Said after visiting the Duke of Connaught. To-day the Khedive sent his children to visit that officer. It is reported that Arabi Pasha is two miles from Ismailia. The conduct of De Lesseps is causing complications.

PORT SAID, 11.—The cable between here and Alexandria is now open for business. A cable station is on board the telegraph ship John Pender, in the harbor. The British fleet in the harbor consists of the ships *Agincourt*, *Dee*, *Monarch* and *Northumberland*.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 12.—The Turkish delegates to the conference informed Dufferin that no troops will be landed in Egypt until the arrival of the Turkish special Commissioners.

MALTA, 12.—General Sir Garnet Wolseley arrived here en route to Alexandria; he is quite well.

FALMOUTH, 12.—The steamship *Herrmann* will take the 500 steerage passengers of the wrecked steamer *Mosel*; the cabin passengers will await the arrival of another steamer.

LISBON, 12.—A dispatch from Buenos Ayres states that the vessel carrying Lieut. Bove and the members of the Italian Antarctic expedition has been wrecked off Cape Horn. All on board were saved.

LONDON, 12.—Lord Dufferin insists, in order to secure harmony of action, that no movement of Turkish troops, when they are in Egypt, should take place without the preliminary consent of Gen. Wolseley.

MADRID, 11.—A dispatch from Tangier states that holywar is being preached throughout Morocco against the Christians.

Sheikul Islam prohibits the Ulemas from preaching in favor of Arabi Pasha.

LONDON, 11.—The Company Commissariat and transport corps embarked to-day, on the Prussian *Monarch*.

PORTSMOUTH, 11.—The transport *Texas* took on board to-day a brigade of artillery. The transports *Bolivar* and *City of Para*, with the Second Battalion of the Royal Irish Regiment and a detachment from the Commissariat and Medical Depart-

ments on board, sailed to-day for Egypt.

The transport *Catalia*, from Malta, arrived.

Malta, 11.—The steamship *Palmyra*, with two batteries of artillery and a large quantity of ammunition arrived here to-day.

The transport *Thalia* proceeds to Port Said by way of Ismailia.

Lieut. Col. Sir J. M. Adaye will command all the land forces in Egypt until Lieut. Gen. Sir Garnet Wolseley arrives.

Major General Sir A. Allison will shortly take the post of chief of the intelligence department for both the British and Indian contingent.

The main body of British troops will remain on board the transports until Gen. Wolseley arrives. This will leave Gen. Wolseley free to land elsewhere than at Alexandria when he thinks fit.

The ambulance association intends to send a corps of trained soldiers to Alexandria under the direction of Vicountess Strangford.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 11.—The assent of England to the proposal of Count Orti, the Italian ambassador, for temporary international protection of the Suez Canal, is coupled with a reservation making an exception in the cases of the force of Majewre, which means practically that of the international police organized to guard the canal, that they shall not interfere with military operations.

Turkish journals are assuming a friendly tone towards England.
