

TELEGRAPHIC. SANGUINARY FIGHT.

A Conflict Between Deputy Sheriffs and an Armed Mob.

RESULT OF A VOLLEY OF SHOTS.

State Troops Ordered in the Scene of Disturbance.—More Trouble Expected.

LEWISTON, Ill., June 9.—Deputy sheriffs with Winchester rifles and an armed mob of strikers met at Lewistown today and the first week of the strike in the quarter and the discharge ceased almost with copious shedding of blood. The conflict came this afternoon and as the result of a volley of shots one man was killed outright, two have since died, two others are reported to have fallen into the canal after receiving mortal wounds, and fourteen others were wounded, three fatally.

Early this morning the men began to gather in the streets to discuss the situation. At 10 o'clock they turned a procession and began to march. About half a mile out of town near Smith & Jackson's camp the men took the bridge along the canal, and marched by twos. Along this route they were shadowed from river by troops. It was the intention of the strikers to arrive at the different camps to drive out the workmen as they had done before. The best in the strike had been in the morning. When the conflicting factions were about two hundred and fifty yards apart, firing suddenly began. The strikers fired first, but there is no question that the strikers were badly wounded. When three or four were wounded, they fled to the river in the wildest confusion. As they ran to rescue themselves behind trees and in thickets, they carried away of their wounds with them, but others were left behind. One of the leaders among the strikers was left lying where he fell with a bullet hole in his temple. It is said by some that he was not a striker, but a section hand on the St. Louis & Valley railway who was killed by a stray bullet. He has not yet been identified.

The killing in Lewistown tonight was that the day's work was a dead blow to the strike, though many expect more trouble. The strikers do not talk of revenge. They deny that they were armed, though the ramp men say the strikers fired first. Thirty strikers were arrested by deputy sheriffs and sent to Joliet.

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SPRINGFIELD, Ill., June 9.—Governor Altgeld, having been advised by the sheriff of Cook and Will counties as to the situation at Lewistown and the impossibility of securing a sufficient posse of deputies, at midnight ordered out the first and second regiments of State troops. They began to assemble shortly after, and as soon as possible will proceed to the scene of the disturbance.

CHICAGO, June 9.—At a late hour tonight the officers of the second regiment are hurrying around gathering up men for an early start on their trip to Lewistown. The company number nearly 1200 men. The latest advice state that two strikers were killed, twenty wounded and thirty taken prisoner.

Several Fatalities.

KALAMAZOO, Mich., June 9.—The building house of Ben E. Hughes & Co., temporarily suspended today. The suspension was due to the heavy work of repairs and inability to pay 25 cents on the dollar. A fire on a branch of the bank at Holland yesterday perpetrated the closing of the bank in this city. The fire, which was caused by an accident, and the bank has the confidence of the community.

JACKSON, GRIFFEN AND COMPANY.

CHICAGO, June 9.—Jerabek, Griffith & Co., private bankers, failed today. The liabilities are \$200,000, and the assets \$24,000. Jerabek was a real estate dealer and failed with assets of \$200,000, and liabilities of \$151,000.

UNABLE TO STAND A BEN.

ALTON, Ill., June 9.—The bank of J. H. Hyatt & Company failed today. From information received here it appears a run had been in progress for several days and caused the failure. The details have not been learned.
