

WOMEN DESTINED TO BE RULING SEX

Country Said to Be Drifting Into
The Age of the "Eternal
Feminine."

MAN IS BEING DRIVEN OUT.

Mr. Bodine Startles Delegates to An-
gual Convention of International
Assn. of Factory Inspectors.

Detroit, Aug. 15.—The annual con-
vention of the International Association
of Factory Inspectors opened here
today. About 150 delegates were pres-
ent. The speech of Mr. Bodine, who is
superintendent of compulsory education
at Chicago, was the feature of
the day and created a mild sensation
among the delegates. The speaker pro-
posed federal statistics covering the past
20 years, showing that the industrial
competition of women, children and
mauve labor was driving the men out
of the large cities to fields of heavy
industry in mining and agriculture.
He declared that women were destined
to be the ruling sex in industry,
and continued:

"Man, like the Indian, is dying out
and being driven out. In 1890 there
were 1,571 women who were em-
ployed in manufacturing occupations in Amer-
ica. In 1899 the number had increased
to 5,229,807. The birth rate among the
female population is increasing and the
death rate decreasing. It is
the reverse among the males. We are
rapidly getting to the age of the
feminine, when man will be
a badge number and forced to return
to the soil and to those fields of labor
where only his physical endurance will
help him in the struggle for survival."

In discussing the competitive life for
the leadership in society, the speaker
said:

"Society is dying out at the top. It
is a crystal maze of glass houses, where
no decent dares cast the first stone,
and the upper 5% who were em-
ployed in graceful occupations in Amer-

FISH TRUST'S PLEA.

Booth Company Names Other Con-
cerns Which are Unmolested.

Columbus, Ohio, Aug. 15.—A Booth &
Co. of Chicago, a corporation popularly
designated the "fish trust," again
against which a suit to obtain its monopoly
was filed yesterday, the action
that has supported President Shear rep-
resented at least two-thirds majority
of those present today.

Former Vice President Gould was on

and refused to concur in the commit-
tee's findings.

BOYCOTT AGAINST AMERICAN GOODS.

Shanghai is the only Place Where
It Has Assumed a Serious
Aspect.

SOME HEADWAY IN CANTON.

State Department is Being Fully Ad-
vised Regarding Embargo and
Progress of Movement.

Washington, Aug. 15.—Dispatches re-
ceived at the state department today
from China show that Shanghai is the
only place where the boycott against
American goods has assumed anything
like a serious aspect. At Canton the
movement has made some headway,
but at other points it has not been suc-
cessful. This information was supplied
in response to instructions sent some
days ago to Minister Rockhill and the
consular officers in China to keep the
state department advised as to the pro-
gress of the boycott.

One dictated on this subject received
today was not made public at the state
department, but sent to the president
at Oyster Bay.

GOULD SHORT ON CASH.

Teamsters' Officials Charged With
Some Funny Business.

Philadelphia, Aug. 15.—The Interna-
tional Brotherhood of Teamsters closed
its convention in Philadelphia yesterday
and the faction that has supported Presi-
dent Shear represented at least two-thirds
majority of those present today.

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SUSPENDS COINAGE.

Philadelphia Mint is Entirely Out
of Silver Bullion.

Washington, Aug. 15.—The suspension
of gold and silver coinage at the Phil-
adelphian mint, beginning tomorrow, is
explained at the treasury department
by the statement that the stock of sil-
ver bullion is entirely exhausted, and
there is no call at present for gold or
minor coins. Some time in October
it is thought the accumulation of minor
silver will warrant the resumption
for a time of coinage of silver dollars
into subsidiary coins, as has been
proposed, but the outlook for contin-
ued active operations at the Phil-
adelphian mint are not regarded as good.

During the current suspension of coin-
age the mint will be open to receive de-
posits of gold bullion as usual.

HE WILL HANG.

Prokoko Sentenced for Assassina-
tion of Chief of Police.

Vilborg, Finland, Aug. 15.—The court-
marital which has been trying Prokoko,
the man who shot and killed Col.
Kremanker, chief of police of Vilborg,
Finland, today sentenced him to be
hanged.

Prokoko refused to plead unless tried
by a Finnish court, and the witnesses
summoned by the prosecution said they
would testify only before a Finnish
judge. A crowd of 5,000 persons inde-
demnified outside the governor's
palace yesterday, protesting
against the trial of Prokoko by
court-martial. A regiment of soldiers has
arrived to reinforce the garrison, as
the mob threatens reprisals.

Thousands Have Fake Names.

Philadelphia, Aug. 15.—According to
a statement made by the director of
the department of public safety, based
on a sentence made by the police, there
are 60,000 names on the voting lists of
the city which, under the law, have no
right to be there. The assessors in
all the voting districts of the city will
be asked to strike the alleged fraud-
ulent names from the lists.

JAP ARMY IMPATIENT.

Anxious to Once More Commence
Operations Against Russia.

London, Aug. 15.—The Daily Mail's
dispatches, with regard to the faming
condition in Asia Minor, state that
the Spanish government has en-
tirely failed to give relief, and that the
money grants are inadequate to
meet the necessities, the resources are
exhausted.

Hunger deaths are of daily occurrence.

Flots and floods are common, and it
is impossible to maintain crops when
a drop of rain has fallen in that district
since March, and the summer and au-
tumn crops will be ruined unless rain
falls soon.

It is feared that the peasantry will
try to take the law in their own hands, and
any new signs of open revolt are pene-
trating, and desperation at the govern-
ment's inaction is becoming daily more
pronounced.

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Auto Kills Two Children.

Baden Baden, Aug. 15.—Two children
were killed during the motor car re-
lability run from Baden Baden in
Nuremberg, on the second stage of
the race, through the Horkemar-
trenny. The accident occurred one mile
from the start of the race while a car
was rounding a corner.

NINE BLOWN UP.

Elkins, W. Va., Aug. 15.—Nine Ital-
ians, who were engaged in their
house reduced to atoms by a dynamite
explosion at the construction camp of
Dunleavy Bros., about six miles from
Dunleavy, between 1 and 2 o'clock this
morning. It is thought to be only an-
other chapter in the feud between the
gangs of desperadoes and Italians.

MRS. PECKHAM INNOCENT.

She Was Not Connected With the
Cotton Leak.

Washington, Aug. 15.—This afternoon
the district attorney, in response to
many inquiries by the press as to the
appearance of Mrs. Sarah H. Peckham
before the grand jury, made the follow-
ing statement:

"Mrs. Sarah H. Peckham appeared in
response to the subpoena served on her
in New York and was examined by the
district attorney. She was willing to ap-
pear before the grand jury, but the main
point of contention was whether she
was connected with the so-called cotton leak,
and was excused from attendance before
that body."
