

WOMEN DESTINED TO BE RULING SEX

Country Said to Be Drifting Into
The Age of the "Eternal
Feminine."

MAN IS BEING DRIVEN OUT.

Mr. Bodine Starts Delegates to Annual
Convention of International
Assoc. of Factory Inspectors.

Detroit, Aug. 15.—The annual convention of the International Association of Factory Inspectors opened here today. About 100 delegates were present. The speech of Mr. Bodine, who is superintendent of compulsory education at Chicago, was the feature of the day and created a mild sensation among the delegates. The speaker pronounced a forecast covering the past 20 years, showing that the industrial competition of women, children and machine labor was driving the men out of the large cities to fields of heavy manual labor in mining and agriculture. He declared that women were destined to be the ruling sex in industrialism, and concluded:

"Man, like the Indian, is dying out and being driven out. In 1880 there were 3,214,571 women who were employed in the United States. In 1890 the number had increased to 5,120,807. The birth rate among the female population is increasing and the death rate decreasing. It is just the reverse among the males. We are rapidly drifting to the age of the 'eternal feminine,' when man will be a back number and forced to return to the soil and to those fields of labor where only his physical endurance will save him in the struggle for survival. In assessing the competitive life for the leadership in society, the speaker said:

"Society is dying out at the top. It is a cruel game of glass houses, where the strongest dashes cast the first stone, and the weakest is left to perish. Society has mothers who are slaves to the street, and fathers who are slaves to the office. The children of the poor are the children of the future. When a fashionable mother is talking about the 'eternal feminine,' she is talking about the 'eternal feminine' of the poor."

New Orleans, Aug. 15.—The will of Archbishop Chappelle was pronounced today. The bequest was as follows: All of the property, real and personal, I give and bequeath to the Right Rev. All my real and personal property, situated in the diocese of Little Rock, Ark., I give and bequeath to my nephew, Josephine Chappelle.

SOLDIER KILLED.
Private Run Over by a Gun Carriage at Presidio.

San Francisco, Aug. 15.—During a drill at the Presidio today Private Fred Farmer of the First battery, field artillery, came to his death under the wheels of a gun carriage. He was riding a new horse in a fresh team, when the connecting bar between the parts of the gun carriage broke. The horse became frightened and ran away. Farmer jumped from his saddle backward, hoping to escape what appeared to him to be an inevitable wreck.

He fell beneath the front wheels, which ran over his body, breaking the ribs. He was then seen to struggle with the horse, but was caught by the hind wheels, one of which struck him at the shoulder, knocking him down and crossing his neck.

STAGES HELD UP.
Passengers Relieved of Money on The Yosemite Route.

Fremont, Aug. 15.—Mauder details of the daring robbery by a highwayman of the Yosemite valley stages running between Raymond and Wadsworth, were obtained here tonight. The stages were held up one at a time, about three and a half miles below Atwood, a few miles above Grub Gulch. Passengers were relieved of their money.

FISH TRUST'S PLEA.
Booth Company Names Other Concerns Which are Unmolested.

St. Louis, Mo., Aug. 15.—A Booth & Co. of Chicago, a corporation popularly designated the "fish trust," against which a suit to ouster was recently filed by the attorney-general on the ground that it was organized in restraint of trade, today filed an amended answer in the circuit court.

The answer admits that the defendant is a corporation, incorporated under the laws of Illinois, with a capital stock of \$5,000,000, and that it has purchased 24 fish companies. The answer denies it is a trust in restraint of business, and names several hundred fish companies still doing an independent business.

It also names 333 corporations in Ohio, among them the Standard Oil company, which are organized in the same way and doing business without molestation. It says the company is properly incorporated under the laws of Illinois, and is entitled to all the benefits thereof.

Edward Dines with Joseph.
Ischl, Austria, Aug. 15.—King Edward, who is going to Marienbad to take the cure, was the guest tonight of Emperor Francis Joseph. The emperor met King Edward at Garden Ground and accompanied him to the dinner. Covers were laid for 20 persons at the dinner. There is no political significance attached to the meeting of the two monarchs. King Edward will proceed to Marienbad tomorrow.

Rudderless in a Gale.
Buffalo, Aug. 15.—The steamer Idlewild, carrying 200 women and children, was tossed about rudderless on Lake Erie for five hours in the high wind which blew all day. When off Windmill point the rudder broke.

The steamer was brought into port by tug, which was summoned by persons on shore who saw her distress. The falling of a smokestack endangered the lives of many, and a number of women were landed in a hysterical condition.

BOYCOTT AGAINST AMERICAN GOODS.

Shanghai is the only Place Where
It Has Assumed a Serious
Aspect.

SOME HEADWAY IN CANTON.

State Department is Being Fully Advised
Regarding Embargo and
Progress of Movement.

Washington, Aug. 15.—Dispatches received at the state department today from China show that Shanghai is the only place where the boycott against American goods has assumed anything like a serious aspect. At Canton the movement has made some headway, but at other points it has not been successful. This information was supplied in response to instructions sent some days ago to Minister Hookhill and the consular officers in China to keep the state department advised as to the progress of the boycott.

One dispatch on this subject received today was not made public at the state department, but sent to the president at Oyster Bay.

GOULD SHORT ON CASH.

Teamsters' Officials Charged With
Some Funny Business.

Philadelphia, Aug. 15.—The International Brotherhood of Teamsters closed its convention today. A number of delegates left yesterday and the faction that has supported President Shea represented at least two-thirds majority of those present today.

Former Vice President Gould was on the rack for more than an hour. His integrity had been brought into question by the committee of officers' representatives. The committee stated that it had no account of \$500 of the \$2,300 expended by Gould, in a speech, defended himself and declared he had never presented a bill that was not legitimate. He was supported by President Shea and Delegate Turley, former secretary-treasurer, the latter having added Gould's accounts.

The convention adopted a resolution of confidence in Vice President Gould and refused to concur in the committee's findings.

SUSPENDS COINAGE.

Philadelphia Mint is Entirely Out
Of Silver Bullion.

Washington, Aug. 15.—The suspension of gold and silver coinage at the Philadelphia mint, beginning tomorrow, is explained at the treasury department by the statement that the stock of silver bullion is entirely exhausted, and there is no gold at present for gold or minor coins. Some time in October it is thought the accumulation of uncurrent silver will warrant the resumption for a time of coinage of silver dollars into subsidiary coins, as has been proposed, but the outlook for continued active operations at the Philadelphia mint are not regarded as good.

During the coming autumn season of coinage the mint will be open to receive deposits of gold bullion as usual.

HE WILL HANG.

Prokono Sentenced for Assassination
of Chief of Police.

Viborg, Finland, Aug. 15.—The court-martial which has been trying Prokono, the man who shot and killed Chief of Police, today sentenced him to hang. Viborg refused to plead unless tried by a Finnish court, and the witnesses summoned by the prosecution said they would testify only before a Finnish judge. A crowd of about 1,000 persons gathered outside the governor's house here yesterday as a protest against the trial of Prokono by court-martial. A regiment of dragoons has arrived to reinforce the garrison, as the mob threatens reprisals.

Thousands Have Fake Names.

Philadelphia, Aug. 15.—According to a statement made by the director of the department of public safety, based on a census now in progress, there are 60,000 names on the voting lists of the city which, under the law, have no right to be there. The assessors in all the voting districts of the city will be asked to strike the alleged fraudulent names from the lists.

Auto Kills Two Children.

Baden Baden, Aug. 15.—Two children were killed when the motor car reliability run from Baden Baden to Karlsruhe, on the road to the competition for the Mercedes trophy. The accident occurred five miles from the start of the race while a car was rounding a corner.

Nine Blown Up.

Elkins, W. Va., Aug. 15.—Nine Italians were blown to shreds and their house reduced to atoms by a dynamite explosion at the construction camp of Dunlavy Bros., about six miles from Durbin, between 2 and 3 o'clock this morning. It is thought to be only another chapter in the feud between a gang of desperadoes and Italians.

MRS. PECKHAM INNOCENT.

She Was Not Connected With the
Colton Leak.

Washington, Aug. 15.—This afternoon the district attorney, in response to many inquiries by the press as to the appearance of Mrs. Sarah H. Peckham before the grand jury, made the following statement:

Mrs. Sarah H. Peckham appeared in response to the subpoena served on her in New York, and was examined by the district attorney. She was willing to answer before the grand jury if necessary, but the district attorney concluded from his interview with her she was not connected with the so-called Colton leak, and was excused from attendance before that body.

Poisoned Her Husband.

Pratt, Kan., Aug. 15.—Mrs. Harvey Noll, charged with murder in the first degree in having, it is alleged, poisoned her husband, a well-to-do farmer, and H. C. Kelly, a farm hand, charged with aiding and abetting in the crime, has been arrested here. Mrs. Noll was released on bond. Kelly, who is several years her junior, was unable to furnish bond.

Peace Disturber Shot.

Yale, Ore., Aug. 15.—Frank Cammon, aged 25, was shot and instantly killed in a drunken quarrel at Westfall on Sunday last. The quarrel involved several other persons, but none seriously injured. The participants being hurt during the shooting, but none seriously save Cammon, who dropped dead from a bullet in the head.

City, the marshal of Westfall, was shot at by Cammon while acting as a peace officer. He returned Cammon's fire with fatal effect.

NO AID FOR STARVING.

Spanish Government Entirely
Fails to Give Relief.

London, Aug. 15.—The Daily Mail's dispatches with regard to the famine condition in Andalusia, Spain, state that the Spanish government has entirely failed to give relief, and that the money grants are inadequate to meet the necessities, the resources are exhausted.

Hunger deaths are of daily occurrence, theft and pillage are common, and it is impossible to maintain order. A drop of rain has fallen in that district since March, and the summer and autumn crops will be ruined unless rain falls soon.

It is feared that the peasantry will take the law in its own hands, and even now signs of open revolt are plentiful, and expectation at the government's dispatches is becoming daily more pronounced.

JAP ARMY IMPATIENT.

Anxious to Once More Commence
Operations Against Russia.

London, Aug. 15.—The Times correspondent with Gen. Nogai's headquarters in the field sends the following dispatch, dated Aug. 12, by way of Kyau: "The Japanese army has been anxious to commence operations. The higher officers do not believe that the military progress has been sufficient to justify the expectation that Russia will conclude the terms necessary required by Japan."

"If the war continues the nature of the operations and the conditions point to the likelihood that future operations will be restricted to the neighborhood of the railway. While turning movements, as suggested in the European press, are not likely to be features of the campaign, nor is it possible that any great military results will ensue this year."

Drake Makes Good.

Springfield, Ill., Aug. 15.—Announcement was made last night that Dr. Asa Drake, who for 25 years has been attempting to establish the claim of the Drake heirs to certain realty in New York, has at last been successful. He has been awarded leave for New York today to receive \$10,000. This is a representation, it is about one-half the sum which he would have received if he had been successful in his claim.

Dr. Drake, who has grown old in the fight over the property and has been with frequent disappointments when he was on the verge of securing a settlement, returned to his wife and children, and the main facts in the story were confirmed by his counsel.

It is understood that the entire estate amounts in value to about \$20,000, and this sum will be divided among a large number of heirs. Real estate alone was involved.

Mayor of the Play Ground.

New York, Aug. 15.—A unique election has been held among the boys who disport themselves on Hamilton Fish playground, an East Side park. Under the tutelage of the city commissioner of parks they cast a regular ballot last night for mayor of the play ground, and elected Nathan Kane, 14 years old. All the boys under 15 were allowed to vote and they rallied to Kane under the banner of the Political Party party. Lads to the number of 80 were registered but
