## BOUNTY FRAUD CASE NOW BEING HEARD

Trial of Wm. R. Swan Discloses  
Easy Graft in County  
Clerk's Office.

## REPUBLICANS HOLD PRIMARIES

Five Councilmen Nominated and Dele-  
gates Named for City Convention  
—News Briefs

Odgen, Oct. 9.—The case of the State of Utah vs William R. Swan and Arthur H. Conlisk was called for hearing before Judge Howell shortly after 11 o'clock today, the following jury having been secured to try the case: Charles H. Gilowell, Heber Lund, George J. Hunter, George A. Horwood, William P. James, Virgil P. Johnson, Aaron G. May and Franklin Woods. After the trial was sworn Judge Madison for the defense moved to keep the information on the ground that it had not been brought under the proper statute. The laws of 1898, under which the action was brought, makes the offense complained of a felony, while the laws of 1903, under which defendant claimed it should have been brought, make it a misdemeanor. The motion was argued quite vigorously, after which Judge Howell overruled it and the hearing was begun.

County Clerk David A. Mattson was the first witness. He testified that a warrant for \$257 was issued to A. H. Conlisk, Jan. 14, 1905, for 94 coyotes, 11 wildcats, 19 wolves and two mountain lions. The witness stated that Conlisk came into the office on the day mentioned and inquired for Swan, who was then deputy clerk. He was told that Swan was not in, whereupon he replied that he would wait for him. He then left the office and found a warrant to Conlisk for the amount stated. Mr. Mattson noticed that Conlisk brought no skins to the office and that Swan failed to follow him out, and he immediately proceeded to investigate. He reported the matter to District Attorney Halverson with the result that a day or two later Swan and Conlisk were both taken into custody.

State Auditor J. A. Edwards testified that the warrant was presented to his office and the sum of \$257 paid the bail.

The witness identified the warrant and it was introduced in evidence by the prosecution.

Conlisk was to go up the stand this afternoon, while Mr. Jones, convicted of bounty frauds, was also to testify.

Odgen, Utah, Oct. 12.—At the afternoon session of the district court in the hearing of the state against William R. Swan, the first witness called was Sheriff Joseph W. Bailey who testified that he placed the defendant under arrest Jan. 16, 1905 and a warrant for his arrest was issued the following morning. Defendant was informed A. H. Conlisk had made a statement or confession and defendant was told he could make a statement if he desired. Defendant admitted that he issued the voucher on which the warrant was given for \$257, that the money was divided equally between defendant and A. H. Conlisk, and he admitted that there were no bides presented on which the voucher was issued.


County Clerk Mattson testified that he had a conversation with defendant Swan a few days after his arrest when
