FIFTY-SIXTH YEAR.

SECOND DAY OF THE BIG LAND DRAWING

Home Hunters Still Anxious About The Lottery Game Down At Provo

STILL CRINDING OUT NAMES.

Real Residences Were Given in Drawing Today Whereas That Was Not The Rule Yesterday.

MAY YET WAIT FOR SHAKE "OUT."

Commissioner Richards on Forest Reserve Ruling—Non-Utah Press Representatives Present.

(Special to the "News.")

Provo, Aug. 18.—The drawing is progressing more rapidly today than yesterday, and will exceed the 200 mark. Delay was caused yesterday by getting started, and the reading of the first 11 names to the public, and their delay work began at 3 o'clock which means that eight hours of hard work will be done today. There is no crowd to speak of around the place of drawing, a few people coming and going as the work progresses. After the first 11 names were read out yesterday, the crowd rapidly dispersed. There is little delay, however, outside a number of people around the bulletin board when the names are called out as soon as a sheet of 10 is filled. Commissioner Richards is highly pleased with the way the work is being conducted and this can be said of all who have given the matter any attention.

Walter Williams, Clarence Peterson and Hoyt Ray are the boys who draw the numbers today.

FOREST RESERVES.

A telegram has been received by Commissioner Richards from a Washington official which states that the secretary of the interior has instructed the general land office in response to inquiry of Commissioner Richards that the lands within the boundaries in the Utah forest reserve are now open to mineral location and exploration. That during the 40 days period provided for in the proclamation the land is to be opened to settlers occupied and entered only in accordance with the terms of the proclamation and are not subject to mineral exploration or location. After that period such of these lands as are not mineral in character will be subject to the operation of the mining laws as are other public lands of like character. The control and use of the waters flowing over and upon these lands are governed by the laws of the state.

After the date fixed for the opening of said land, under the present proclamation, these lands will be under the jurisdiction of the general land office and will not be subject to the control or under the jurisdiction of the interior bureau.

SALT LAKE IS A CANDIDATE.

Is in the Field to Secure Next Session of Transmississippi Congress.

WHO WILL BE THE PRESIDENT?

Names of Hon. John W. Noble and Col. H. D. Lovell Are Suggested For Coming Term.

Portland, Or., Aug. 18.—(Denver, New Orleans, Kansas City and Salt Lake are the candidates in the field for the next session of the transmississippi congress. This will be developed at the first meeting of the committee on permanent organization. Ex-Gov. L. B. Prince of New Mexico was elected chairman of the committee and A. F. Francis secretary. At the meeting the names of Hon. John W. Noble of St. Louis, ex-secretary of the interior, and Col. H. D. Lovell of San Francisco were suggested for the presidency for the forthcoming term.

EIGHTY ARE STILL MISSING IN WRECK

But Twelve Known Dead Have Been Taken from the Submerged Cars.

NARROW ESCAPE OF TUG BOAT.

Just Passing Through When Train Plunged into the Draw—Reversed Engines in Time.

Norfolk, Va., Aug. 18.—Only 12 known dead had today been taken from the wreck of the Atlantic Coast Line railway, though there are 80 of the colored excursionists yet missing. The probabilities are that the bodies of many of these will be found in the bottom of the river.

A wrecking and salvaging company raised the two submerged cars, but as they did so the cars fell out of the cars and what there were went to the bottom of the river with the debris.

TWO WHITES DEAD.

The river is now being dredged and it is expected that a number of bodies will be taken from the water before night. The latest victims to be found were an unknown colored man and an unknown colored woman. The only white persons known to be dead up to this time are W. E. Jolly, the promoter of the excursion, and his young nephew Edward Jolly.

SIXTY WERE INJURED.

About 60 or more 100 excursionists have come to Norfolk either slightly injured or bruised. There are 33 injured at the hospitals with 12 known dead, which leaves between 50 and 60 of the excursionists yet missing.

PAID RED FLAG.

The Atlantic Coast Line officials have given out no statement in the matter, but Cleveland Thompson, an eye witness, says that the small tugboat which was passing through the draw, had failed almost completely.

The tug for which the draw was opened was just passing through when the train dashed into the water.

The tug reversed her engines quickly and barely avoided being caught by the engines in its descent.

Cleveland Thompson declares that Engineer Reid remained by his engine up to the last and did not jump as first reported. Reid was badly injured about the head and body, and is now in the hospital. He may recover.

RESCUED THIRTY-FIVE.

J. J. Thompson, aged 60 years, a farmer and father of Cleveland Thompson, rushed with an axe to the scene and helped 25 persons jump to the second car. He cut a hole in the top of the car and rescued 35 persons just before the car dropped into the water and became almost completely submerged.

CARLOAD OF DEAD.

At noon drivers went to the bottom of the river at the scene of the wreck and found a carload of dead men, women and children, these being the victims in the first car behind the engine whose bodies went into the water.

The work of raising the car load of dead bodies found in the river will begin at once.
