FOREIGN.

LONDON, 28.—The *Mark Lane Express*, in its review of crop prospects, says the recent rains have materially benefited the root crops; there has been, however, too much rain for late potatoes, which have shown the commencement of disease, and this will cause a greater demand upon lower descriptions of wheat, and prevent their further depreciation. The grass possesses the verdure of spring, which will help growers to carry their stock through the winter, notwithstanding the deficiency in the hay and straw crops. The wheat trade shows neither encouraging nor discouraging features; prices in France are a shilling lower, but elsewhere on the Continent they are unchanged, except at Odessa, where the market is firmer in the hope that the fine quality of the crop will eventually secure better prices.

QUEENSTOWN, 28.—Among the passengers by the steamer *Russia*, which sailed yesterday for New York, was Miss Nielson, the actress.

RIO JANEIRO.—An insurrection has broken out at Buenos Ayres, in consequence of alleged fraudulent conduct at the late Presidential election; General Mitre is at the head of the insurrection.

KONIGSBERG, 1.—Fourteen persons, convicted of taking part in the riots of Medenau, Northern Prussia, last June, have been sentenced to terms of imprisonment varying from six months to three years.

LONDON, Oct. 2.—A special telegram from Berlin says the Emperor William has written to the King of Italy saying that he will be unable to visit Rome in the autumn, as he intended.

The steamship *Faraday* has arrived at Queenstown.

At five a.m., a barge lying in the Regent's canal, near the Zoological Gardens, loaded with powder, exploded, killing a number of persons and wounding many, and shattering the bridges and houses in the vicinity.

Later.—The report of the explosion was heard for a distance of twenty miles from the place where it occurred. Firemen have been dragging the canal all this morning, and up to now five bodies of the victims of the explosion have been recovered. The lights in the railway station and other buildings two miles away, were extinguished by the concussion. Many persons had a narrow escape from death. A number of animals in the Zoological Gardens were killed. The quantity of powder that exploded was four tons. The details of the occurrence show that its disastrous effects were widespread. Many trees were uprooted, four houses located two miles distance from the canal were shattered. Seven persons are yet missing. There was a perfect panic here for hours, and it was not till the cause of the terrific report was learned that the fears of the people were allayed. Several persons died from fright.

LONDON, 2.—The steamer *Faraday* will put to sea soon. She has taken in provisions and coal, and will resume the attempt to recover the direct cable, which she had laid six hundred knots when lost;

should her efforts be successful, she will proceed to lay the remainder of the cable to the American coast.

VIENNA, 2.—The Emperor Francis Joseph has decorated all the members of the Arctic exploring expedition, including the sailors.

LONDON, 3.—A Spanish steamer, just now in the harbor of Sligo, has been warned by the authorities not to sail, and orders have been issued to prevent her departure; she has thirteen Armstrong guns on board, which are supposed to be destined for the Carlists. The captain declares that the guns are the property of the Spanish government, and he is taking them to England for repairs. An investigation is in progress.

ROME, 3.—The King has issued a decree dissolving the chamber of deputies, and ordered a new election on the 8th and 25th of November. Parliament is convoked to meet on the 23rd of November.

ROME, 3.—*La Liberta* says the Pope's letter to President MacMahon was written in reply to the announcement of the withdrawal of the man-of-war *Orenoque* from Civita Vecchia; the Pope recognized the reasons for this measure, but declares that he would not have used the vessel to quit Rome under any circumstance. The ultra montane journals represent that the Pope desired the recall of the *Orenoque* in order that France might no longer be exposed to complaints and menaces on this account.

LONDON, 4.—A meeting will be held to-morrow, at which steps are to be taken to obtain government relief for the sufferers by the gunpowder explosion in Regent's Park canal.

MADRID, 4.—Layard, minister of Great Britain, and M. De Chandordy, the newly appointed minister of France, were received by President Serrano last evening, and presented their credentials. M. De Chandordy, addressing the President, hoped the difficulties of Spain, which now seemed to be passing away, would soon wholly disappear, and gave expression to the wishes of his government for continued friendship between the two nations. Marshal Serrano thanked the minister for his cordial expressions, and fully reciprocated the friendly desires of France. Mr. Layard, in presenting his credentials, declared his confidence in the triumph of the Spanish government in the present crisis. It was noticeable that both the ministers addressed Serrano as president of the executive power, and in their speeches made no allusion to the republic.

VIENNA, 4.—The *New Free Press* reports that Denmark has sent a note to Berlin, with reference to the expulsion of Danes from Schleswig. The note cites various treaties by virtue of which Danish subjects in Prussia are to enjoy all the privileges accorded to the most favored nations, and seeks to show that they are liable to expulsion only for open violation of law.

RIO JANEIRO, 4.—The insurrection in the Argentine States continues and is becoming formidable; the fleet has declared for General Mitre, the leader of the movement. The insurgent forces had assembled at Chiveley and San Martin. The government at Buenos Ayres is taking vigorous measures to meet the storm. The chambers are in permanent session. The national guard has been mobilized and a state of siege proclaimed in the provinces of Buenos Ayres, Santa Fe, Entrerios, Arrecites, and Corrientes. The newspapers at Buenos Ayres have suspended publication.

CAIRO, 5.—The Nile is running above the usual point reached in the periodical overflow, and there are fears of a disastrous inundation. The government is endeavoring to prevent serious damage.

PARIS, 5.—Returns from elections for the Council General are slightly in favor of the conservatives. Prince Napoleon was defeated at Ajaccio.
