Material Increase Shown in Production

Growth of Mining Just Begun.

Growth of Mining Just Begun. A recent Daily Consular and Trade Report contains the following para-graph on Japaa's mineral output: The Chugai Shogyo Shimpo states that the mining output generally showed more or less increase, with a tendency of still further increase in the future. The production of coal amount-ed to about 12,000,000 tons, an increase of 1,500,000 tons, the output of petro-leum to 1,510,000 kokut (koku, 40 galions), an increase of about 200,000 kokut; the gold produced up to the end of Novem-ber was 720 kwamme, equal to about 5,976 pounds; silver, 19,000 kwamme, or about 157,000 pounds, both showing a slight decrease. The output of iron ore was 17,000,000 kwamme, or 141,100,000 pounds, an increase of about 50,000,000 kwamme, and of sulphur 50,000,000 kin (kin, 1 1-3 pounds), also showing some increase.

(kin, 1 1-3 pounds), also showing some increase. The exports of refined copper from Japan during 1966 up to November, were valued at \$10,729,000, as against exports of \$5,000,000 and \$5,280,000 during the same periods of 1905 and 1904. Japanese imports of tube copper, however, also show increases, those for the first ten months of 1906 amounting to \$357,500, as against \$285,000 and 142,000 in the same periods of 1905 and 1904.

Day yesterday and round amars at that prominent property going along in ex-cellent shape. The dry concentrating plant installed recently is proving a surprising success. The lead ores of the mine are treated by air and this novel method is attracting favorable attention throughout Utah and Colo-rado. The inventor of the process used at the May Day has orders to fill for at the May Day has orders to fill for five separate companies in Colorado alone, as a result of the fine showing made by his machinery at the May Day property. The arrangement of the ta-ble, for instance, is simple and thor-oughly effective. A table, ribbed with edged strips of wood, similar to the regular wet table, is covered with heavy canvass. An electric appliance fills a space below the table with comfills a space below the table with com and a solution of the second over the table furnishes a complete up-draft. All dust and light waste material are thus drawn from the table, leaving the heavier lead and valuable ores to be shaken into a box. The capacity of the May Day mill is in the neighborhood of biay bay min is in the neighborhood of 100 tons a day but it is not being pushed to this out-put. A handsome daily production is being maintained, more care being devoted to thorough work than the quantity of concentrates turned out.
