CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, from the committee on commerce, reported with amendments the House bill for the appointment of shipping commissioners to report to the Senate committee on privileges and elections on the House resolution declaring that the substitution by the Senate of its bill to reduce existing taxes, for the House bill repealing the duties on tea and coffee is unconstitutional, and notifying the Senate that the same has been tabled, was received. The report discusses the constitutional features of the case at length and the character of the bill in question and finally comes to the conclusion that the House bill under consideration was not a bill for raising revenue within the meaning of the constitution, therefore that while the Senate might have amended it so as to abolish the duties altogether on other articles, the Senate had no right to enact it as it did, with the amendment providing that revenue should be collected on other articles, though at a less rate than that previously fixed by law. The amendment was discussed by the House by citing the former action of the House in similar cases.

The deficiency bill was taken up and pending the motion of Bayard tabled, the amendment of Morrill, of Vermont, restricting the jurisdiction of the court of claims in suits for captured property in six cases commenced within two years after the close of the rebellion and to a final claimant, was rejected, the Vice President giving the casting vote in the negative. The amendment was discussed till the Senate adjourned.

HOUSE.

There was much excitement over the report of the committee on printing, 1,000 copies of the American case presented at Geneva. The committee recommended the printing of one half the number fixed by the Senate resolution.
