Others of the sisters from Salt Lake City offered remarks in the encouragement of the business, giving good counsel and advice in regard to the observance of every effort to make the business a success, extending their remarks to portraying the virtues and ambition that should characterize the mothers in Israel in helping to sustain Zion, not only in making the apparel of her daughters beautiful in the workmanship of their own hands, but in training their children in all the virtues becoming to the profession of Latter-day Saints.

Meeting then adjourned until the 14th February, 1880.

FREMONT, Dodge County, Neb.,
Nov. 6th, 1879.

Editors Deseret News:

I have now arrived here at Nebraska to visit the Saints in this locality, according to appointment, and find most of them enjoying the good spirit. They have been under the watchcare of Elder W. H. Newman, who has fed them with the bread of life. He has labored some in Western Nebraska, and thinks that on our coming visit to them, we will be able to initiate some of them into the Church, but it is here as in other of the Northwestern States—we need assistance. We have, to the best of my knowledge, only three Elders in this district which is six States and one Territory. I, with Elder Howard, have been laboring in Michigan with very good success. We have added 14 to the Church, of which several never heard the gospel till we came. We have made many friends to the cause and removed a vast amount of prejudice, and had invitations to send elders to visit them, and have them make their home with them as long as they liked.

I have traveled a good deal and have labored to a good deal of advantage as it has fallen to my lot to hunt up the scattered Saints and report where and what could be done, but for all that I can truly say the Lord has blessed me, and given us success. I have held, with the different elders I have traveled with, over 80 meetings, and have sowed a good deal of seed which I hope will be gathered by some elder in the near future with a good increase.

Elder Newman and myself were at the east bound train and saw Elder Farr from Ogden, and four others, bound for their different fields of labor; they had arrived safe and happy that they were considered worthy to go on the Lord's errand. A week ago to-day at Omaha I also saw several elders bound for Europe, Pennsylvania, and the Southern States, among whom were Elders Dixon, Stewart and Jones. They likewise looked cheerful and showed in their very countenances that they carried the peace of the Lord with them.

The people here as in other places feel that there is a change at hand but they are unable to tell what. By many it is supposed that this political strife will make a change in affairs, especially when this great nation has been under the necessity of calling upon other nations to help them in a crusade against the Mormons, showing a political weakness, having to resort to such feeble measures, and making them the laughing stock of our own thinking people as well as the intelligent abroad.

Hoping our Elders may all be encouraged in the good work and that Zion may prosper and flourish upon the mountains, I remain your brother in the covenant.

Dear Sirs—In your leader, on temperance, in Saturday's issue, we have indeed a "word fitly

spoken," which we trust will be, like "apples of gold in pictures of silver," to your many temperate readers. "Wisdom is justified of her children." We are pleased to be able to say that there is one business block in our city where there is no saloon. We will call it Council House block for the sake of distinction. Ladies can "go to market" on the north side of First South Street, west, without being annoyed by a saloon. Efforts have been repeatedly made to open such a place of "business" on that exceptional block, but without avail. Land owners and property owners prefer not having it there, considering it to be a demoralizing business. We have no protection, however, in a "legal" form. The City ordinance touching the selling of intoxicating fluids, gives the Mayor no discretionary power. Any party making legal application to him for license to sell fermented liquors on any block within corporate limits of our city, can obtain it.

It is, however, we are pleased to say, the intention of the great temperance advocates hereabouts to petition the City Fathers to grant and ordain, that any person applying for a license to vend, wholesale or retail, any kind of intoxicating drinks, "shall have to obtain the names of two-thirds of the land and property owners and tenants, owning or living on the block where the person applying for the license want to open the "business," failing to obtain which he cannot obtain the license. A protecting ordinance of this kind would enable all citizens to have a voice in the temperance cause which we do not enjoy at the present time. The public will, so expressed, would evidently prove a powerful regulator. A temperate citizen solicited for his name would politely decline to give it, assigning as a reason, that the "demoralizing business" would be a disgrace to the block and injurious to legitimate trade.
