Park gets 11,000 of the new shares, covering the original cost to him of the mine. The American parties guaranteed the mine to be a true fissure vein and say it is doing well. An agent of the English parties, and General Burnett, of the law firm of Bristow, Peet, Burnett & Opdyke, have started to Utah to examine the titles and the transfer of the property.

LANCASTER, Pa., 15.—The great stock stable of Elizabeth Farms, belonging to G. Dawson Coleman, of Lebanon, and situated in the north-eastern section of Lancaster County, was destroyed by an incendiary fire. The famous registered herd of Jersey cattle, many of them imported, 52 in number, were chained in their stalls, and when the fire was first seen, it had attained such headway that not one of them could be saved. Thoroughbred dogs, goats and game chickens were also burned. Many of the cattle were highly valued, some of the bulls costing \$3,000. Loss, \$30,000.

DETROIT, 18.—A shocking tragedy was enacted at Lapeer Village, 70 miles north of Detroit last evening. While the people were at church Mrs. Barnard went to the house of Rev. E. Curtis, Baptist pastor, attacked his wife an old lady about 65, threw her down, poured gasoline over her clothing and set it on fire. The poor woman was shockingly burned but she lived a few hours. Curtis until last year was pastor at Greenville in this State for several years. Mrs. Barnard came to Lapeer a few weeks ago from Greenville, where she lives, being the wife of quite a prominent lumber man, and a woman about 40 years old. She has been busy meantime attending meetings, mingling in general society, but giving no intimation of any ill will towards her victim. It is believed by many that she is insane from religious excitement, but others think the case downright wickedness. She is under arrest.

PHILADELPHIA, 18.—About half past two this morning one of the tanks at the Atlantic Oil Refinery, Point Breeze, exploded with terrific force and the burning oil was scattered in every direction. The concussion broke windows a mile distant and the flames spread rapidly not only to the adjoining tanks, but to the wharf and shipping. Four tanks soon took fire and a number of vessels which are aground in the Schuylkill were quickly ablaze. A dispatch from the immediate vicinity, at 9.15 a. m., says the entire place is on fire. The report that the shipping is on fire seems premature. It is now stated that all the vessels were in fact at 9 o'clock. There are two loaded vessels in the stream, however, opposite the works, which are burning, namely the *Competition*, with filled cases, and the *Maryland* with filled barrels. One of the city ice boats has gone to their assistance. The wharves are all in flames and the employes have been compelled to leave the office. The fire originated in an agitator. The explosion was heard and felt at the extreme northern points of this city and as far down the river as Chester. The last great fire at the works occurred in June, 1878. All the shedding along the wharves are now on fire and the destruction of the whole works greatly depends on the force and direction of the wind.

BRIEF TELEGRAMS.

The Yorktown centennial bill passed the Senate to-day.

Floods are doing immense damage in the Spanish provinces.

The cost of the Afghanistan war is estimated officially at £17,500,000.

A number of Irish members of Parliament have seceded from the Parnell party.

Justice Swayne informs his associates that he will resign and go on the retired list.

Reports have been started that Greece intends attacking Turkey at the end of January.

Hawkes, the first republican Governor of Tennessee for ten years, was inaugurated to-day.

The Texas & St. Louis Railroad has at last reached Corsicana, which is 203 miles from Texarkana.

The exports of domestic bread-stuffs from the United States for the month of December, 1880, were \$18,214,748.

A railway accident occurred at Wakefield, Yorkshire, and seven persons are reported killed and 30 to 40 injured.

The dead bodies of Knox Pinckard and a colored servant, buried in a snow-slide in Colorado, have been recovered.

Leading Ohio republicans say Garfield is really troubled about finding a satisfactory man to take the Treasury portfolio.

Davett spoke on Sunday near Kanturk. He vehemently attacked the landlords. Government reporters were present.

The New York *Tribune* suggests the name of Lincoln for the State to be sooner or later formed out of a portion of Dakota.

The London *News* believes that France has abandoned the proposal to the powers to offer her mediation to Greece and Turkey.

Instead of the defeat of Turcomans by Gen. Skobeloff, it now transpires that the Turcomans severely defeated Gen. Skobeloff.

By an explosion of naphtha, yesterday, in the Wheeler & Wilson works, Bridgeport, Conn., one man was fatally and three others badly burned.

The receiving warehouse of the Old Dominion Company, Norfolk, Va., burned with 400 bales of cotton and general merchandise, worth \$10,000.

By unanimous vote the Massachusetts democratic legislature caucus this afternoon voted General B. F. Butler its candidate for United States Senator.

Indians in the State of Chihuahua December 23d killed four men, two women and child, and afterwards murdered four shepherds and wounded four others.

Gladstone, replying to the address of the Dutch Peace Society, states that the question of Transvaal will have the careful attention of the government.

One million three hundred and fifty thousand dollars has been deposited by the members of the new syndicate for building the Canada Pacific Railroad.

A bottle has been picked up on the Jersey beach, with intelligence that the steamer *City of Boston*, burned June 29, 1870. It was signed by A. Herick, of Treque.

The reception of Gen. Grant this afternoon at Albany, was one of the greatest public demonstrations ever witnessed in this city. Fully 75,000 people were in the streets.

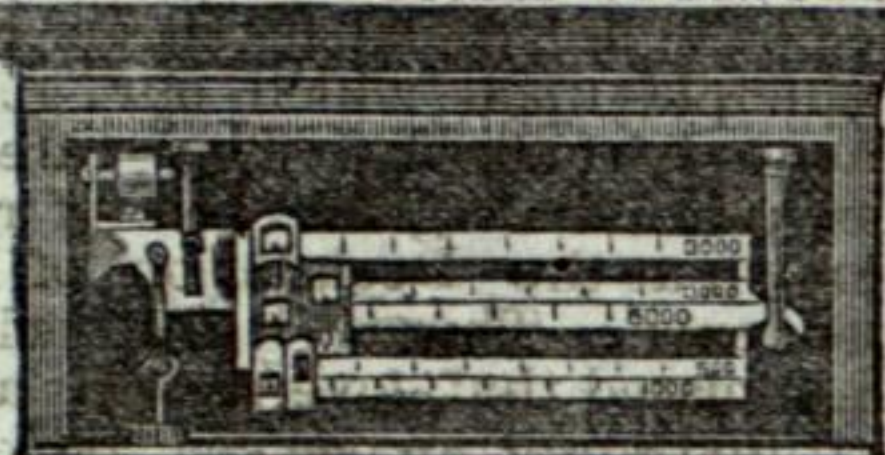
