The powers of grand Juries in Utah are sharply defined in the laws. The following, from the Poland bill, shows their extent:

"The grand jury must inquire into the case of every perion im-prisoned within the district on a criminal charge and not indicted; into the condition and management of the public prisons within the district; and into the wilful, cor-rupt misconduct in office of public officers of every description within the district; and they are also enti-tied to free access, at all reasonable times, to the public prisons, and to the examination, without charge, of all public records within the district."
