DISTRICT IS PROSPEROUS.

Wool, Timber and Health Are Great Products of Territory-Lakes Are Full of Trout.

Mr. John N. Henrie of Panguitch, Garfield county, is the representative in the seventh legislature from the twenty-third district of the State of Utah. Mr. Henrie is almost a giant physically, and is correspondingly broad in his mental capacity. He talked interestingly of his home section today, bringing out a number of, facts not generally known to the residents of the northern districts of the state. "Garfield county is within one of being the southernmost county in the state, the county of Kane lying between it and the Arizona line," explains Mr. Henrie," "The eastern edge of Garfield borders the state of Colorado, and within the county there are two distinct kinds of cli-mate. In the western portion, where Panguitch, the capital, is located, the country is more capital, is boarded, the country is more or less mountainous, and here the temperate cilmate pre-dominates and the winters are more or less severe; while in the eastern part in and around Escalante, the altitude is much lower and a semi-tropical climate is the rule.

GREAT SHEEP COUNTRY.

"Panguitch is situated 260 miles south and west of Salt Lake City, and is 55 miles south from Marysvale, the nearmiles south from Marysvale, the hear-est railroad point on the Rio Grande Western. The town contains about 1,309 people, who are mostly engaged in sheep and stock raising and farming. Grazing on the ranges of Garfield counare 100,000 sheep, producing annual-about 700,000 pounds of wool for ex-rt. "The wool is of first class quality, and every pound is sold on the ground to eastern buyers, and shipped mostly

"Our people are very proud of their public schools. We have a new school building that cost in the neighborhood of \$20,000 of \$20,000.

ANTIMONY MINES. "We have extensive deposits of a good quality of coal in the eastern portion, and several antimony mines east of Cayote. Lack of transportation facili-ties makes it impossible to do anything with these mines, but we are hoping the Rio Grande Western will build into our country in the near future. Mr. Harris re-ports the situation much worse in the case of business rentals. One Market Row tradesman has to pay \$250 per month. or \$3,000 per year for a one story shack. A well known Main street clothing man has to pay in rent, light, fuel and other expenses of mainten-ance \$27,500 per annum, and his store is only a very moderately sized apart-ment. His purchases of last year amounted to \$117,000, so that it will be seen he has to realize a heavy per centage in order to make both ends meet. Mr. Harris says heavy rentals are the main factor in forcing upward the cost of living, and should be made to come down.
