

A LARGE PUNCH BOWL.—In 1784, when the Right Honorable Edward Russell was Commander-in-Chief of the English forces in the Mediterranean, at an entertainment given to the fleet by that gentleman, the basin of one of the fountains in the garden was turned into a punch bowl, and filled with that beverage. The following ingredients were used in its preparation:

Four hogheads of brandy and eight of water, twenty-five thousand lemons, twenty gallons of lime juice, thirteen hundred weight of fine Lisbon sugar, five pounds of grated nutmeg, three hundred toasted biscuit, and a pipe of Malaga wine; and to complete the arrangement, a boat was floating upon it, in which was a small boy, who rowed around the fountain and filled the cups of the guests, and in all probability more than six thousand men drank of it.

PROPOSED INNOVATIONS.—Lord Campbell, the Lord Chancellor of England, has renewed his hitherto ineffectual effort to induce the British Parliament to abolish that principle of the trial by jury which requires the unanimity of the jurors. Parliament has already limited the application of trial by jury, by enacting lately that in some cases the decision of a Judge or Magistrate may supersede that of a jury on questions of pure fact. The Lord Chancellor would go much farther, to advocate the passage of a law providing that if the jury in a civil action cannot agree, after having deliberated a certain time, the verdict of a certain number of them—probably a majority—may be taken as a verdict in the case. It is not proposed to make such a change in criminal cases.

EARTHQUAKES IN SAN FRANCISCO IN 1808.—The XIXth volume of the Provincial State papers in the Archives of California, in the Surveyor General's office, shows that eighteen shocks of an earthquake were felt at the Presidio of San Francisco, between the 21st of June, 1808, and the 17th July of the same year—a period of twenty-six days.

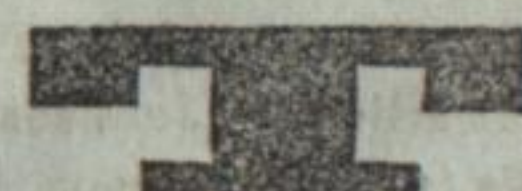
