## SHOCKING DEATH OF SMALL CHILD.

Little Alice McBride Fatally Burned While Lighting a Fire.

Ogden, Utah, Sept. 15.—As the result of a serious illness sustained Wednesday, Alice, the little six-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas McBride, died yesterday at the family residence, 129 Twenty-eighth street, and will be buried Sunday morning at 11 o'clock from the family residence. The little girl was left in the kitchen while her mother went to another part of the house, secured a match, and started to light a fire in the kitchen stove. When by some means her clothes caught on fire, she screamed and her mother rushed to her assistance, but the flames had burned her little body terribly. Dr. Gordon was called and rendered every assistance possible, but she suffered great pain, which was only relieved by death. The parents are heartbroken over the sad death of the only girl in the family.

Factory Improvements.

Silver Lake Reservoir—Religion Class Conference Sunday—News Briefs.

Special Correspondence. Lehi, Utah Co., Sept. 15.—There is no Lehi spirit in Lehi that around the Sugar factory these days. The work is being rushed to get ready for the fall campaign. Nearly all the steel work for the new \$100,000 Stevens house and its machinery are in place. Many other changes have also been made in the factory which has put it in the very best of condition for grinding up the best of the fall wheat. While the white flax has caused a great deal of damage to some patches, a sufficient crop will be harvested to insure a successful run. The digging of best will commence the 25th of this month and the factory will commence cutting Oct. 2. The government experts have seen this white flax in hand and it is expected that they will by after year be able to apply a remedy which will get rid of it as soon as it makes its appearance. However, it has been the experience that this flax does not make its appearance in one place more than one year, and judging by conditions in the past, next year a greater tonnage per acre will be raised than ever.

## SILVER LAKE RESERVOIR.

A number of men have been sent up from Lehi, American Fork and Pleasant Grove to work on the Silver Lake reservoir. It is proposed to store the flood waters of American Fork canyon in this lake for use in the late summer and fall. The water supply will be materially increased thereby. E. M.
