SUDDEN DEATH OF JOHN MALLISTER

Stricken With Apoplexy in His Room at the Healy Yesterday Morning.

DISTRICT COURT BUSINESS.

Mrs. McBride Will be Buried in Idaho By Legal Husband—Joseph Parry Investment Co.

Ogden, April 2.—John McAllister of Salt Lake, who came to the Healy hotel on Tuesday evening, was found dead in his room last evening about 6 o'clock. Apoplexy was the probable cause of death, the man being stricken while dressing yesterday morning, as he was partly dressed.

McAllister was about 35 years of age. He wore good clothes and had considerable cash and valuable jewelry on his person. Bank books carried by him show considerable money deposited with the National Bank of the Republic in Salt Lake. Deceased had been suffering from rheumatism. He was on his way to the Utah Hot Springs for treatment. On his person was found a letter from J. W. Elliott of Salt Lake, addressed to the proprietor of the Hot Springs resort. The letter stated that McAllister was a personal friend of the writer and that he would guarantee payment on any check he might draw on the bank. It is said that McAllister's father lives in the western part of Salt Lake, and that they were partners in the ownership of Williams' ranch. A brother, William McAllister, is believed to be in Gunnison, Utah.

WILL BE BURIED IN IDAHO.
Remains of Mrs. McBride Taken Care Of by Legal Husband.

Ogden, April 22.—The body of Mrs. Mary Ann McBride, who was known in Ogden as Mrs. Mary Nelson and who hanged herself Sunday night in a rooming house on Twenty-sixth street, will be buried in Idaho Falls. Such is the announcement of William McBride, a barber of that city and legal husband of the woman, who arrived in the city yesterday.

Mrs. McBride separated from her husband more than a year ago and since that time had been living in Ogden as the common law wife of "Dutch" Nelson, a partner in a saloon and a character of the city. It was decided by the country authorities that no inquest would be necessary. The body was taken to Idaho Falls today by the former husband and a grown daughter.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION.
Articles of incorporation of the Joseph Parry Investment company were filed with the county clerk yesterday afternoon. The capital stock of the concern is \$50,000 divided into shares of the par value of \$10. The officers and directors are Joseph Parry, president; Walter Parry, secretary and treasurer; Summer P. Nelson and Albert Parry, directors. The principal business of the company will be real estate, investments and insurance. The life of the corporation is 100 years.

CRUSADE AGAINST VICE.
The crusade against gambling in Ogden seems to be slowly vanishing itself into shape, but as yet nothing definite in the matter has been learned by the sheriff and county attorney. A conference between County Attorney Harris and some of the signers of the petition which called for a prosecution in the case held another conference the other day. The petitioners stated that while they were morally certain that the evil existed they could not take a positive stand against the alleged gamblers.

County Attorney Harris said that he and the sheriff were continuing the investigation and would find out soon

whether gambling exists in Ogden or not. He stated that he was handicapped by the statutes which do not permit the confiscation of the gambling paraphernalia nor allow the sheriff the right to break down doors to gain an entrance. Another conference with the petitioners will be held within a few days.

ARBOR DAY IN OGDEN.
In view of the fact that Governor Cutler has designated April 15 as Arbor day, preparations have already been under way for a number of days for planting trees and shrubbery and yard cleaning. For the past few years great interest has been taken in Arbor day and this year's observation of the day promises to eclipse anything in the past. Already large orders have been placed with the nurseries for trees and shrubbery and the board of park commissioners has received a carload of trees and shrubbery which will be planted in the city's parks and along the streets and avenues.
