Four new buildings were erected for school purposes, Murray's twenty-fifth district taking the lead with a new building costing \$25.161.48. The other new buildings are Murray's twenty-sixth district strueture, which cost \$608.65; Union's, \$2,877. and South Taylorsville's sixty-fourth district, \$200.

> The sum of \$217,610.88 is invested in school property in all the districts of the county. Of this amount \$174,801,43 represents the value of buildings, \$19,-100.75 the value of the grounds, \$16,-835.95 the cost of furniture, and \$7,874.* the value of apparatus. During the year \$22,019.85 was paid
