LOCAL BRIEFS.

Attorney Soren K. Christensen returned last night from California where he has been for the past 10 days on legal business.

The regular meeting of the W. C. T. U. will be held in the Central Christian church, corner of Third East and Fourth South Streets, Saturday afternoon at 8 o'clock.

Two cases of smallpox were reported to the board of health today. They are Aver H. Cornwall, aged 22, residing at 156 West First North street; Mrs. Downing, aged 23, residing at 327 East Fifth South street.

The train for the L. D. S. University hall at Salt Lake tonight, leaves the depot at 8 o'clock. Contrary to a somewhat prevalent impression, there is only one train. The return will be made before midnight.

The regular monthly meeting of the Salt Lake County Horticultural society will be held on Saturday afternoon at 1 o'clock at the city and county building. The subjects for discussion are spraying, planting and pruning.

Orders from Washington direct Capt. T. R. Rivers, R. A. Brown and Veterinarian R. W. McKelvin of the Fourth cavalry to meet at Ogden May 19 to inspect horses to be bought for the quartermaster's department of the army. They will afterwards go to Weiser, Idaho, and Seattle on similar errands.

The report of the city schools for the seventh month ending April 7 shows an enrollment of 12,567 pupils, of which 18 are colored. There are 235 teachers employed in the schools, and the average number of pupils per teacher is 53. During the month covered by the report there was not a single case of corporal punishment in any of the schools. There were 58 cases of truancy and 21 cases of tardiness. The average per cent of attendance was 93.4, and the average of punctuality was 97.7 per cent.

A lectern has just been placed by St. Mark's cathedral, as a memorial to Mrs. Fannie Corwin Woodman, and was consecrated by the Rev. Father Spalding. Mrs. Woodman died in 1876, and the money for the purchase of the lectern was left by the late Col. Woodman as memorial to his wife's memory. The lectern is 6 feet 3 inches high, the body of it being a fine large eagle carved in wood, and at the base on a band of brass is the inscription, "To the Glory of God and in Loving Memory of Fannie Corwin Woodman, Died 1876. Easter, 1905."

E. C. Helfrich of Mountain Home, Ida., is in town on a business trip, and says that the \$40,000 reservoir 20 miles from Mountain Home has been completed and will irrigate 4,000 acres of land. The first reservoir built 10 years ago, three miles from Mountain Home irrigates 3,000 acres of land, and another being built on the Camas reservation will irrigate 12,000 acres. There are more reservoirs to be built, and all combined will irrigate 50,000 acres. Mr. Helfrich says that Elmore county which is 76,165 miles in area, has now 8,000 acres under irrigation.

MRS. SCHUMACHER DEAD. Wife of Traffic Manager of Short Line Passed Away Yesterday.

Mrs. Mary Vandilder Schumacher, wife of Thomas M. Schumacher, traffic manager of the Oregon Short Line, passed away yesterday afternoon at the Pacific hospital in Los Angeles. The cause of death was acute dilatation of the heart, from which the lady had been suffering severely since Tuesday last. Funeral services will be held in Los Angeles this afternoon, after which the remains will be cremated and the ashes taken by Mr. Schumacher on Saturday via the Rock Island to Painesville, Ohio, the old home of the deceased, for interment.

Mrs. Schumacher was 48 years of age and the only child of Cotton Allen, at one time mayor of Columbus, O. She had been a sufferer from heart trouble for years, and the high altitude of this city made it impossible to remain here for any length of time. When here Mrs. Schumacher made her residence at the Knutsford. Recently she was taken ill in Chicago, and Mr. Schumacher went east and brought her to the coast. Ten days ago he received a dispatch of the critical condition of Mrs. Schumacher and at once left for her bedside, traveling from Sacramento to Los Angeles on a special train.

The news of the sad demise was received in the form of a brief dispatch in the "News" yesterday afternoon, too late for publication.

JURY SAYS HE IS NOT GUILTY.

W. F. Reeder, Tried for the Murder of Bill Charley, a Ute Indian, Acquitted.

WAS OUT FORTY-FIVE MINUTES.

Homicide Occurred Near Thompson's Springs in September of Last Year.

(Special to the "News.")

Moab, Utah, April 20.—After being out 45 minutes, the jury in the case of the State vs. W. F. Reeder returned a verdict of not guilty. Reeder was tried for the murder of Bill Charley, a Ute Indian. The homicide occurred about 25 miles north of Thompson's Springs in September of last year. Reeder is a prospector and resides at Elgin in this county.

The names of the jurors who tried the case are L. G. Gentry, J. P. Miller, Frank F. Hatch, B. D. Perkins, Hiram Allen, Gilmore Harris, William Jacobs and R. L. Fish.
