from following their lawful vocations: that the freedom of speech has been abridged and the rights of citizens to peaceably assemble has been prevented. Personally I know nothing of these complaints, but I charge you to investigate them, and if you find any viola-tion of law in this rotard, amounting to criminality, 1 charge you to indict the guilty parties, whomsoever they may "False imprisonment is a crime under the laws of our state, and I charge you it is as unlawful to prevent a person by force from going where he lawfully wills as to unlawfully compel him to go against his will by force where he will not go. Either is false imprisonment. The right of people to peaceably assemble and petition for the redress of grievances, real or imaginary, is a constitutional right, and any interference with the proper exercise of such right is a crime to attempt to force or threat to prevent a person from engaging in any kind of lawful employment or bustness, or to conspire to do him or his family any injury by reason of his en-gaging in any lawful employment in which he may desire to engage.

"If two or more persons conspire to commit any act injurious to the public health, to public morals or to trade or commerce or for the perversion or obstruction of justice or the due administration of the law, such persons are uilty of criminal conspiracy. I further harge you that all persons concerned n the commission of a crime, whether be felony or misdemeanor, and wheth they directly commit the act conituting the offense, or aid and aber its commission, are principals in any rime so committed. Any person who vilfully resists, delays or obstructs any oublic officer in the discharge of any luty of his office, is guilty of a crime nd every public officer, who, under the olor of authority, without lawful ne-essity, assaults or beats any person, is uilty of a crime. An unlawful assembly is, whenever two or more persons ssemble together to do an unlawful act parate without doing or advancing to ard it, or do a lawful act in a violent oisterous manner.

"I have thus invited your attention to a few of the most common criminal acts most likely to happen in a community and under circumstances like vailed in this county, but there are many others. You should indict no peron through malice, hatred or ill will nor leave any unpresented indictment through fear, favor or reward."
