

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

SABBATH SERVICES.—Elder George T. Young, who has been called to fill and treated upon the duties of those who go on missions to preach the gospel, and the blessings which they receive as a result of their labors if they faithfully discharge those duties.

President Joseph Young dwelt on the means by which salvation is to be obtained; and touched upon several principles of the gospel showing the necessity of our regulating our lives by them, and the happy results which follow by so doing. The spirit of the gospel teaches us to charity and kindness, one towards another, and inspires those who possess it to avoid seeking evil of the brethren, and to learn the will of God and do it in all things. He exhorted the brethren to cultivate brotherly love, and to walk in paths of righteousness continually. Elder John Taylor followed, treating on the varied and multiplied blessings which the children of men enjoy; and referred to the great change which the inhabitants of the earth have to undergo, in fulfillment of the prophecies, that purity may reign and health and longevity be enjoyed by them. He exhorted what nation is endeavoring to bring about any change? Not one, nor the inhabitants of any of them. But the Lord has shown to us revelations; and by obedience to them we commence this great regeneration. Wisdom is taught to us that we may govern ourselves to extend life, increase happiness, travel upwards and onwards towards exaltation, and aid in bringing to pass the high destiny and promised glory of Zion.

THEATRICAL.—On Saturday night there was a very crowded house—the largest we have seen for some time. The farce of "Slasher and Crasher" opened the performance, and was played in the most lively manner. "Nick of the Woods," with its exciting scenes, delineations of frontier life in the Kentucky of former days, stirring sensations, Indian incidents, and the terrible vengeance of Bloody Nathan, the Jibbenamoyas, was performed in a spirited manner, and prevented anything like dullness till the close. Mr. Waldron played the title role with great force. It is not a character that "vaunting ambition" would choose for a display of great declamatory powers or to show the polished elocutionist; but it has some strong and broad points, which none but a man of much ability and stage experience could make well. Mrs. Waldron, as Belle Bon, made a very favorable impression. She was evidently suffering from a cold; yet she showed the possession of a good voice, added to an excellent figure and a graceful carriage. Other characters will doubtless display her abilities to better advantage. She was warmly greeted on appearing. Mr. McKenzie's Colonel Tom Bruce and Mr. Hardie's Stockpile were very strongly marked and cleverly drawn characters. And the whole piece was well given, with the tableaux presented in good style.

To-morrow evening "The Island King" will be performed for the first time in this city. It is a drama of great interest, with very fine characters in it. Mr. and Mrs. Waldron, and a full cast will appear. The farce of "Dandelion's Dog" concludes the performance. There should be a crowded house, for the play, of itself, is a genuine treat to theatre-goers.

AGRICULTURAL MEETING.—Pursuant to the call of Bishop Hunter, published in Friday's News, a meeting of Bishops, their counselors and leading men of this city and places sufficiently contiguous to send representatives, was held in the Tabernacle this morning. It was well attended and the importance of systematic cultivation, sowing certain seeds in the places best adapted to them, and kindred matters with regard to improvement in agriculture, were discussed by practical farmers. A committee was appointed to inquire further into the subject under consideration; and the meeting adjourned till Friday next.
