

CUBA READY FOR SELF GOVERNMENT

Gov. Magoon Takes First Step Toward Its Re-establishment In Formal Manner.

TRANSFER WILL SOON BE MADE

Preparations Practically Complete—Gen. Gomez Will Take Inaugural Oath at Noon, Jan. 28.

Havana, Jan. 1.—The inaugural step toward the re-establishment of the Cuban republic was marked with the New Year's reception at the palace today, when Gov. Magoon formally presented the diplomatic representatives and consular officers, the supervisors of the governmental departments, the judges of the supreme and minor courts, the presidents of the commercial guilds, the representatives of the foreign and native press, the officers of the Cuban armed forces and many prominent citizens to the president-elect, Gen. Jose Miguel Gomez, and to the vice-president-elect, Alfredo Zayas.

The palace was beautifully decorated, and Cuban military bands played during the reception which lasted from 10 o'clock in the morning until 3 o'clock in the afternoon. Gov. Magoon received in the grand salon.

The governor was attended by his aides in full dress uniform, with Gen. Gomez, Senor Zayas and the former American consul, Frank Steinhart, who was the official adviser of the government during the whole period of intervention, standing at his right. The Spanish minister, R. Guaytan de Ayala, dean of the diplomatic corps, congratulated Gov. Magoon on the success of the provisional government, which was about to end. He said:

"The exactness in keeping the promises of President Roosevelt in behalf of the intervening nation to restore Cuba to the exercise of self-government impresses us with a sense of the high moral significance of the government which conferred upon you this difficult and high mission and fills with joy the hearts of the Cuban people. Our sincere and best wishes accompany you, wherever your government finds an adequate place to utilize your services."

The governor expressed his thanks saying after reference to the successful elections:

"The new administration, therefore, assumes office supported by the confidence of the country and the franchise of the people. The commercial, industrial and agricultural situation is excellent; law, order, peace, tranquility and prosperity have not only been established, but have prevailed for a sufficient period to justify the belief that such conditions will continue and

are as permanent in Cuba as in other countries."

Preparations for turning over the machinery of the government to the incoming president are practically complete. Not the least disturbance in the governmental functions will attend the transfer of authority when Gen. Gomez takes the inaugural oath at noon on Jan. 28.

The madman was prevented from carrying out his purpose by officers with whom he fought like a tiger. Wrapped in a blanket, the insane man was taken to the city jail bound hand and foot.

At the station May declared he had dreamed to prove that he was an angel from God. Still maniacal, the man was locked up in a strong cell, where he quivered out of the blanket and began to shout that he was the devil come to put Billy Sunday out of business. He varied these statements by singing hymns.

Before making his spectacular attempt to enter the tabernacle, May went into a waiting room where he disrobed. He was half way to the toilet when he was discovered. His herculean strength enabled him to fight his captors for several minutes before he was overcome and bound.

PRESIDENT HOLDS RECORD RECEPTION

Exchanged New Year Greetings With People of All Lands and Every State and Territory.

VERY PICTURESQUE AFFAIR.

Less Haste Than Usual in Urging the Line of Callers Past the Receiving Party.

Washington, Jan. 1.—President Roosevelt and 6,000 people, representing every land and every state and territory in the Union, today exchanged happy New Year greetings at the White House. For three and a half hours the president stood receiving his guests, and when the reception was ended last year's record of attendance had been broken by over 700. Many men and women distinguished in the official and social life of Washington were present.

The brilliant court dress of members of the diplomatic corps gave a picturesque aspect to the annual function, which throughout was marked by an absence of formality. The number of small children who were brought by their parents to shake hands with the president was unprecedented.

The weather was cool and bracing, and the thousands of people who assembled to greet President and Mrs. Roosevelt showed the utmost good nature during their long wait in the White House grounds before they gained admission to the mansion. There was less haste than is usual in urging the callers past the receiving party. Contrary to the custom of recent years, Mrs. Roosevelt and the ladies of the cabinet remained in the red room throughout the function.

There were receptions at the home of Vice-President Fairbanks, Speaker Cannon and the members of the cabinet.

The closing of all the government departments and of local business concerns enabled thousands of officials and employees to participate in celebrating the day.

President Roosevelt, after receiving at the White House, took a long cross country horseback ride.

Attending for the first time a public reception at the White House were the Philippine resident-commissioners, Legarda and Ocampo, who mingled with the crowd in the state dining-room. They were among the first to wish the president a happy New Year. They talked much with the representatives of other insular governments of the United States.

Cannon was a conspicuous figure. His greeting to the president was particularly cordial. Many of the senators and representatives had parties with them.

Mrs. Roosevelt took an unusual interest in the public feature of the reception, remaining at the side of the president longer than at any previous reception. The reception closed at 2:25 o'clock, when President Roosevelt shook hands with Chief Usher Thomas Stone.

SAN FRANCISCO AND PANAMA.

Reported Independent Line of Steamers Between Them to be Established.

San Francisco, Jan. 2.—It is reported here that at an early date an independent line of freight steamers between this port and Panama, where connections will be made with the Panama railroad and the government line of steamships on the Atlantic coast will begin operations. To this end it is said, a representative of local shipping interests will go to Washington next week to open negotiations with special Commissioner Brewster of the Panama railroad and also confer with the Boston Steamship company, which it is declared, is ready to place steamers on the Pacific coast run as soon as sufficient business is guaranteed by California shippers. The contemplated service will require 24 days between San Francisco and New York and the Boston company is said to be ready to begin the work as soon as an agreement with oriental shippers is reached.

TO GROW TURKISH TOBACCO.

Washington, Jan. 2.—A firm of Turkish cigarette manufacturers have asked the governor of Kentucky to aid in having Turkish tobacco grown in that state. It is declared by the bureau of manufacturers. The firm states that the importations of this tobacco increased to nearly \$4,000,000 last year against only \$12,000 12 years ago. The cheapest Turkish tobacco sold in New York at 65 cents a pound, not including the 35 cents duty.

GAS EXPLOSION.

Wrecks Building and Causes Loss of \$150,000.

Chicago, Jan. 2.—A gas explosion in the Tom Jones restaurant down town yesterday did \$150,000 damages. Two skyscrapers near the wrecked building were damaged slightly.

HARRY D. RADFORD TO EXPLORE ARCTIC REGION

New York, Jan. 2.—Harry D. Radford, a sportsman and writer on natural, historic and out-door subjects, announces that he will leave here during this month to explore the Arctic regions alone. From Edmonton, Alberta, he intends to continue his journey on snow shoes and by means of a sled to travel 5,000 miles and to take three years in doing it. He has never visited these regions, and doubts will meet with great obstacles but he feels confident of overcoming them. Radford will collect specimens and procure data concerning the fauna.

IMPORTS AT SAN FRANCISCO.

San Francisco, Jan. 2.—Total imports through the custom house at this port for the year 1908 were valued at \$46,187,738, according to incomplete figures, that amount showing a gain over the similar business of the previous year of over \$2,000,000. Exports were \$32,695,756, an increase of over \$1,000,000. Exports to the Philippine Islands for the year amounted to \$3,221,032, while imports from the group fell off to \$370,750. Total moneys collected by the custom house from all sources amounted to \$7,846,185.
