INVENTORS GETTING BUSY

Anti-Vibration Wheel and a Gun That Will Not Recoil Are Today's Developments.

An automobile wheel without rubber tires, a wheel that takes the shock of a rough road and undertakes to spare the rider in the tonneau the vibration which has heretofore been one of the drawbacks of automobilism, is the invention of Arthur R. Miskin of Idaho Falls.

Mr. Miskin is in the city today with his wheel and has already precipitated several debates among machinists and others regarding his invention, which he is getting patented at Washington. In brief, the wheel has a flexible steel tire and an arrangement for the spokes whereby the wheel is sprung. When in motion the wheel takes an elliptical shape and accommodates its tire to the obstacles of the road without pitching the vehicle out of the level.

Mr. Miskin claims that it does not take more power to run this "freewheel" than the ordinary inflated rubber tire affords on the modern automobile or bicycle.

KICKLESS RIFLE. N. C. Schellenger of this city is the inventor of a new automatic rifle and will leave Salt Lake Thursday for the purpose of exhibiting a model of the weapon to a big firm in New York. The distinctive features of the new rifle consists of its simplicity, lighter weight, fewer parts and other improvements.

Mr. Schellenger explains that the breech mechanism is locked until the projectile leaves the barrel and there is no "kick" or recoil when the rifle is fired.

He claims that the invention will apply to any caliber rifle or pistol.

FOUR DETENTION HOMES PLANNED

Juvenile Court Commission Will Work to Secure Added Facilities.

SEEK TO AMEND PRESENT LAW

Committee Named to Take Up Labor Along Legislative Line to Make Work More Profitable.

At the afternoon session yesterday of the juvenile court convention it was announced that detention homes would be established in four counties of the state, namely, Salt Lake, Weber, Cache and Utah. The need for such institutions was urged by various persons during the conference, as being most important factors now lacking in the great work now going on in looking after the welfare of minors. It was pointed out that far better results could be obtained if there existed places where delinquent children could be taken care of during the early stages of their wrong doing. It often becomes necessary for the court to take boys and girls from the custody of parents and guardians when conditions surrounding them are found to be inimical to the welfare of the child. The unfortunate should not be sent to the industrial school, as that is considered to be only a last resort. A detention home would supply the deficiency now felt in this direction.

PROGRAM OF INTEREST. The closing meeting was marked by the reading of two interesting papers, one on the Canyon Crest farm, by Mrs. Hugh Park, and the other a contribution on "The Detention Home," from Gov. John C. Cutler. In the absence of the latter, the paper was read by State Supt. of Public Instruction A. C. Nelson. Both papers were discussed at length.

In the election of officers, President D. H. Christensen was chosen to serve another year, as were also Second Vice President Mrs. Hugh Park and Secy. Preston D. Richards. The only change made was the election of George M. Mumford as vice president in the place of H. H. Thomas. A committee to work for amendments to juvenile court laws was announced, to consist of President Christensen, E. G. Gowan, Preston D. Richards, Judge Noon and H. H. Thomas.

He visited New York, stopped in Ohio and Indiana, and had an opportunity to feel the pulse of the people on politics. He says practically everyone is ready to concede the nomination of Secy. Taft for the presidency by the Republicans, and that New Yorkers realizing this will head a movement to stampede the convention for Gov. Hughes for the vice presidency. Mr. Alexander is of the opinion that the nomination of Taft for the second place of the ticket will be forced upon Gov. Hughes in much the same manner that it was upon Gov. Roosevelt in 1900.

IMPROVING CAR LINES. The street railway management has begun active reconstruction of the Wandamere line, which is to be double-tracked and ready for operation by June 1. The Eleventh East street line is also being double-tracked, as part of what will be a through line later on from Second and South streets. The granting of the necessary county franchises Monday enables the company to hurry up the work at once south of the city line. By another season the track two blocks long on east Tenth South street will be taken up. This season it has been merely surfaced up and put in good condition for the summer's demands.

FIVE MORE DISTRICTS. Forestry Inspector Benedict returned yesterday morning from Washington, where he has been for several weeks in attendance on a general gathering of inspectors to discuss plans for a re-division of the present administration of the different forest districts. The idea was to give each supervisor just such an area as he could economically and effectively cover. This was adopted, and a system of further subdivision agreed upon. The general district in which Salt Lake is located will be so further divided as to include five more administrative districts.

Commutation—Dorressa Work, Salt Lake, grand larceny, 25 years; Domingo Lariba, Salt Lake, carnal knowledge, one year; Peter Charland, Salt Lake, burglary, three years; Alma D. Jones, Salt Lake, burglary first degree, three years; Walter E. Burrell, Salt Lake, robbery, 18 years.

McMillan's term was reduced for timely assistance at the prison during the outbreak of 1907, and for his age, and for special good behavior. In fact, the warden has had so much confidence in McMillan that he has expressed himself as ready to put a gun into his hands at any time, and has even signed a petition to have him pardoned a few days in advance in order to secure his citizenship in the state to which he is to remove as soon as released.
