Committee Named to Take Up Labor Along Legislative Lines to Make Work More Profitable.

At the afternoon session yesterday of the juvenile court convention it was announced that detention homes would be established in four counties of the state, namely, Salt Lake, Weber, Cacha and Utah. The need for such institutions was urged by various persons during the conference, as being most important factors now lacking in the great work now going on in looking after the welfare of minors. It was pointed out that far better results could be obtained if there existed places where delinquent children could be tak-en care of during the early stages of where definduent children could be take en care of during the early stages of their wrong doing. It often becomes necessary for the court to take boys and girls from the custody of parents and guardians when conditions sur-rounding them are found to be inimic-al to the weifare of the child. The unfortunates should not be sent to the Industrial school, as that is considered to be only a last resort. A detention home would supply the deficiency now fell in this direction.

PROGRAM OF INTEREST.
