The man who was killed was William Lorree of San Francisco. He was the representative of a tube manufactur-ing works and was riding on the en-gine, assisting in testing a new appli-ance. His body was horribly mutilated. H. H. Mitchell of Los Angeles, a brake-man, was seriously hurt and may die, J. W. Pierson, a colored porter, was badly injured. The wreck occurred between San Anita and San Augustine. The track is completely blocked.

ADMINISTRATION STANDS BY LEASE. Washington, Feb. 21.-Senator Long today conferred with the president in regard to the protest of the Kansas legislature against the renewal of the blanket lease of 1,500,000 acres of oil lands of the Osage Indian reservation

in Oklahoma Territory. The protest al-leged that under the lease the lands were held by the Standard Oll company. subsidiary to that corporation, but this is not the understanding of the presi-dent, the secretary of the interior or the Kinsas members of Congress. The decision was reached and the announcement authorized that the administra-tion will stand by the limited extension contained in a senate amendment to the

contained in a sente amendment to the Indian appropriation bill. The senate amendment provides that any allotments which may be made of the Osage reservation in Okhahoma shall be made subject to the terms and

shall be made subject to the terms and conditions of a lease dated March 16, 1896, given by the Osage nation to Ed-win R. Foster. This lease was ap-proved by the secretary of the interior, and, through assignments similarly ap-proved, is now owned by the Indian Territory Illuminating Oil company. The extension of the Foster lease, for a term of 10 years, is authorized by the amendment to the property actually deimendment to the property actually de reloped under the original lease. Th lands developed amount to about 680,000

lands developed amount to about 680,000 acres. No extension is authorized of the lease covering about \$20,000 acres of oil fields that remain undeveloped. Under the renewal authorized the lease will contain all of the conditions of the or-iginal lease, except that from and after March 16, 1908, the royalty to be paid on gas shall be \$100 a year on each gas well, instead of \$50. Senator Long stated today that it was

well, instead of \$50, Senator Long stated today that it was not his understanding that the Stand-ard Oil company had any connection with the production company holding the lease, and it was believed at the in-terior department that the company de-veloping the property should be given an obportunity to get some return for its financial outlay. The decision of the interior department to stand by the lease so far as it concerns developed property meets his approval.
