CONGRESSIONAL,

SENATE.

Petition From Dakota Legislature.

WASHINGTON, 19.—The Vice-President presented a memorial from the Dakota legislature, asking congressional aid for the completion of the Northern Pacific railroad.

The senate was in executive session, and soon adjourned.

HOUSE.

The Indian Bill—Annoyed.

Daves presented the case of C. A. Wetmore, correspondent of the *Alta California* and other Pacific coast papers, who, having said in his dispatches that there were strange rumors about Beck's connection with the Pacific Mail subsidy, was summoned before the committee, when he said the rumor was a baseless invention of a clerk from Font, banker, to Beck, but he refused to give the name of his authority.

After an indignant speech by Beck, a resolution was adopted, summoning Wetmore to the bar of the house.

The house went into committee of the whole on the Indian appropriation bill, and after discussing without result the proposition to pay the necessary heavy duty on the goods with interest, of the award by the senate in March, '69, the committee rose.

The sergeant-at-arms appeared with Wetmore, who still declined to give the name of the person who mentioned Beck's name to him; he asked till to-morrow to consider whether he could answer without a breach of confidence. Daves offered a resolution, declaring that the witness was in contempt of the house. Houghton advocated granting a fine asked by the witness, and motioned to postpone further consideration of the matter till to-morrow. Cobb moved to adjourn, which would have the effect of ending the session. The motion was carried. Adjourned.

EASTERN.

Vote for Senator.

OMAHA, 19.—The following is the vote in Nebraska to-day for U. S. Senator: First ballot, Daves 17, Dundy 12, Paddock 9, Mason 5, Lett 2, Morton 2, Poppleton 1, Patrick 1, scattering 8; necessary to a choice 27.

DOVER, Del., 19.—Governor Cochran was inaugurated to-day; his inaugural denounces military interference in Louisiana.

Chandler Ahead.

LANSING, Mich., 19.—The ballot in the senate and house, to-day, for U. S. senator, stood, Chandler, the red, was scattered; the rest were scattered; Chandler having a majority in the joint ballot.

A True Bill Found.

PHILADELPHIA, 19.—The grand jury have found a true bill against John W. Gerdemann, ex-priest of St. Boniface church, charging him with embezzlement.

More Balloting.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., 19.—Both houses balloted separately at noon to-day, for U. S. senator. In the senate Johnson received 6, Stephens 5, Brown 3, Bates 4, Savage 2, Qualls 2, Ewing 1, Kennedy 1. Three ballots were taken all alike.

In the house the ballot stood, Johnson 21, Stephens 11, Brown 11, Bates 11, Qualls 5, Ewing 5, Savage 5, Kennedy 5. Three ballots were taken all alike.

Fire and Loss of Life.

NEW YORK, 19.—A fire in Balder's grocery store, Broadway, destroyed goods valued at \$25,000. Mrs. Blood was killed and her two sons fatally injured by jumping from a third story window of the building.

Timothy McCormack and his son Patrick were suffocated, and his daughter Ellen was fatally injured by jumping. A number of others were more or less hurt.

Balloting for Senator.

BOSTON, 19.—The first ballot for U. S. senator taken in the senate resulted—Daves 18, Abbott 14, Hoar 5, Adams 1, Chas. Devins, Jr. 1, Banks 1; in the house two ballots were taken, on the second of which Daves received 88, Abbott 71, Hoar 45, Adams 16. Necessary to a choice 116.

A Bank Closed.

CHICAGO, 19.—The Cook County national bank closed its doors to-day, and the slantary liquidation of the bank has begun.

The amount of the assets and liabilities is not known at present, but the officers assure the public that the creditors will not lose a dollar.

Endorsed.

NEW ORLEANS, 19.—The Louisiana and Mississippi patrons of husbandry have issued addresses to the order throughout the State, endorsing the report of the congressional sub-committee as the simple truth.

Denounced—Balloting for Senator.

AUGUSTA, Me., 19.—In the senate to-day, the balloting for senator resulted as follows—Banks 27, Talbot 3, house, Hamlin 84, Talbot 40.

Inaugurated—Balloting for Senator.

HARRISBURG, Pa., 19.—Lt. Governor Latta was inaugurated to-day. He made a speech denouncing the military interference in Louisiana.

BERLIN, 19.—The Bishop of Paderborn, to-day, was conducted to the fortress of Westel, where he will be interred.

CANADA.

Meeting of Tea Merchants.

TORONTO, 19.—The members of the board of trade, interested in the tea trade, held a meeting and passed resolutions and adopted a memorial to be forwarded to the prime minister, asking him to use the influence of the government with that of the United States, for the purpose of having the differential duty of 10 per cent., at present levied on tea and coffee going from Canada into the United States, removed, and pending the result, that the differential duty be replaced on these articles coming from the United States into Canada.

Great Britain.
Hope For Kingsley.

LONDON, 19.—Canon Kingsley is protected with inflammation of the lungs, but the acute symptoms are diminishing and there is now fair hope of his recovery.

FRANCE.
The Supplies Stopped, &c.

PARIS, 19.—The *Courier de Paris* states that a delegate from the Carlist committee in London has gone to Spain, to inform Don Carlos that the English bankers, with whom the Carlist loan was lodged, have refused to make a further advance.

It is understood that Spain will pay to Germany an indemnity equal in value to the *Gustav* and *Cargo*, in addition to a fine, even if the Carlists are not exacting the same from the Carlists.

SPAIN.
Ordered to be Shot—Castellar's Successor.

MADRID, 19.—On account of the frequent outrages on railway trains, the government has ordered every armed Carlist found in the vicinity of a railway train to be shot.

The Marquis Bedmar has been appointed President of the Spanish commission to the U. S. Centennial.

AUSTRIA.
Resigned—A Conflict Likely.

VIENNA, 19.—The Turkish minister of foreign affairs has resigned on account of the complications growing out of the negotiations regarding the policy of his successor will be more conciliatory, but if a conflict is unavoidable, Austria will endeavor to confine it to the narrowest limits possible. The Montenegrin residents of Leiste and Constantinople are preparing to return home.
