LOCAL BRIEFS.

The farce of "Box and Cox" will be given in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium this evening.

The McKean Post, G. A. R. will give a camp fire entertainment next Saturday night, in Odd Fellows hall.

Evangelist Colburn will speak this evening in the First Baptist church, on "The Unseen." The daily meetings continue very well attended.

D. company, First Infantry, is to be merged into the Signal corps, which will fill the corps to its full limit and have five men on the waiting list.

The Woodmen are making extensive preparations for the reception of Head Consul Cook, who will visit this city, Feb. 15 next. Utah has now 3,500 Woodmen of the World.

Janitor Earnest Gutter of the Jewish temple was severely burned by flames from the temple furnace as he opened the door to replenish the fire. Gutter had a narrow escape from fatal burning.

There will be an entertainment given in the Fourteenth ward assembly rooms Friday evening, for the benefit of the Sunday school, consisting of a literary and musical program, followed by a dance.

There will be an art exhibit in the Ladies' Literary club house, Feb. 25, including pictures and casts from Boston, the proceeds to be devoted to the civic improvement and school corridor decoration funds.

Thirty one cars of coal or 930 tons were received in this city yesterday, 12 cars over the short line, and 19 by the Rio Grande. With the assurance of a continued supply of coal, the local freight has disappeared.

An invitation has been received by Gov. Cutler to attend the reunion of the Springfield comrades of the Black Hawk war to be held at Springfield this afternoon at 2 o'clock. The governor will be unable to accept the invitation.

The infantry from Fort Douglas made a practice march through the city yesterday, giving the impression that they were suddenly ordered to another station. The weather was so mild yesterday at the Post, that the band was able to turn out for guard mount.

Sergeant George H. Huddleston of H. company, Twenty-ninth infantry, at Fort Douglas, is an applicant for examination for an army lieutenancy. He is a graduate of the McKinley Manual Training school at Washington, D. C., and was colonel of the cadet regiment while there.

Peter and August Moyer, formerly Pennsylvania farmers, met in this city yesterday, not having seen each other since leaving the east 25 years ago. August moved to this city back in the 'eighties, while Peter remained in the east, and is now en route to Los Angeles on a visit.

The new street cars are provided with air whistles, which are attached to the air drum connected with the air brakes. The whistles make a good deal of noise, and will not be used in the business section of the city except in case of emergency when it will be necessary to scare people off the track.

Articles of incorporation of the Utah Conference of the Seventh-Day Adventists were filed in the county clerk's office yesterday. Alfred Whitehead is president; Mrs. Eve M. Gardner, secretary; W. L. Gardner, treasurer. The trustees in addition to Messrs. Whitehead and Gardner, are W. A. Alway, A. G. Christiansen and J. R. Williams.

The Salt Lake Medical society held an important meeting Monday night, when Dr. Ross Anderson was chosen corresponding secretary, and Drs. Root, Harrison and A. C. Ewing, censors. The principal feature of the evening, was an able paper by Dr. Townsend on "The Study of the Club with an Aid to Diagnosis, Prognosis and Treatment of Disease."

Copies of the Yale University catalogue for the current academic year have been received in this city from New Haven. The total number of students in the catalogue is 1,100, of whom 1,000 are from Utah, two from Wyoming, one from Nevada, three from Montana, one from Idaho, 13 from Oregon, 11 from Washington, Jan. 25, 1906, one from Arizona and 33 from Colorado.

Through pouches of mail from Mantl, Ephraim, Moroni, Fountain Green and Nephi have been ordered routed to this city via the San Pedro road, instead of over the Rio Grande, thus bringing the Sanpete and Juab county mails into Salt Lake at 1:30 p. m. instead of at 6 p. m., as heretofore. As the Rio Grande will continue to bring mails, this ensures two mails a day from the south.

Articles of incorporation of the Mill Creek Power company of this city were filed in the county clerk's office yesterday. Its capital stock is \$300,000, divided into shares of \$100 each. M. M. Miller is president; D. B. Beaton, vice president; F. M. Lyman, Jr., secretary; John P. Cahoon, treasurer. The company owns the Lyman power plant and water rights in Mill creek, and will operate the same.

The Ladies' Literary club has decided to devote the proceeds of the club's charity day, Feb. 3, at Walker Bros. store, to the model corridor fund of the public schools. Committees from the educational section of the club will be at the store all day in charge of a booth, where candles and refreshments can be had by shoppers. Coupons will be issued with every purchase, and the school turning in the largest number of these to be presented with a fine picture by the home and education section.

Jack Williams of the street railway service has returned from a trip to southern California where he gave special attention to operations of the electric roads. He says that as soon as one gets out of the city limits on the

suburban cars, the fare becomes 50 cents, no matter where you go; but the service is very thorough and effective. Mr. Williams brings back numerous snap shots of cars, switch stations and barns, as illustrating what is being done down in that country in the car operating line.

Charles M. Robinson of Rochester, N. Y., an authority on civic art, is in town en route to Honolulu, where he will study the beautifying of cities, and then report to the department of the interior at Washington. He thinks Salt Lake is an ideal city, whose beauty is greatly increased by the surrounding mountains. He thinks that on general principles, all electrical communications should be underground, but it is better to have the poles in the center of the streets than at the curb.

What proved to be a most interesting meeting of the Daughters of the Pioneers was held in their headquarters in the old Deseret News building on Monday afternoon. Miss Edith Smith was the principal speaker and gave a detailed account of the recent trip to Vermont and other places of historic interest to church people. At the conclusion of Miss Smith's address, Mrs. Susan Young Gates made a few trite and pertinent remarks. The attendance at the gathering was very large and the indications for future growth were as promising as now.

IRISHMEN MEET.

Rev. W. K. Ryan Addresses Them on The Home Rule Movement.

Local Irish patriotism was evoked last night in Knights of Columbus hall at the meeting of the United Irish league, presided over by Rev. P. M. Cushman of Oregon; and about 300 were subscribed for the use of the National league in laboring to secure home rule for Ireland. The meeting was addressed by Rev. W. K. Ryan, who spoke on the coming elections in England, and the momentum gained by the home rule movement. He thought the prospects were brighter than ever, as the English government is beginning to realize the Irish are not only a loyal and able in great numbers as they cannot live there under existing conditions. Other speakers were Rev. J. G. Gahan and Col. Joseph Geoghegan, and there was a musical program. At the conclusion of the meeting 100 new members were secured for the league and Col. Geoghegan was made treasurer.
