

TO PROTECT THE PRESIDENT.

The Senate Passes Bill for That
Purpose, 52 to 15.

WHAT THE ACT PROVIDES.

House Passes the River and Harbor
Bill—Carries Nearly Sixty-One
Million Dollars.

Washington, March 21.—Two important measures were passed by the senate today, the bill for the repeal of the war revenue taxes and that for the protection of the president of the United States. The war revenue bill was passed without division, and after only one short speech. Mr. Tillman embraced the opportunity afforded by the bill's consideration to protest against the repeal of the duty of ten cents a pound upon tea.

The bill for the protection of the president was passed by a vote of 52 to 15. The bill provides that any person who shall willfully aid in the escape of any person guilty of any of the offenses mentioned shall be deemed an accomplice and shall be punished as a principal.

The secretary of war is directed to detail from the regular army a guard of officers and men to protect the president, without any unnecessary display, and the secretary is authorized to make regulations as to dress, arms and equipment of such guard.

At the conclusion of the routine business consideration of the bill to repeal war taxes and for other purposes was taken up on motion of Mr. Aldrich, chairman of the committee on finance. The measure was read at length. All of the amendments prepared by the committee to the house bill were agreed to during the reading of the measure.

At the conclusion of the reading of the bill, Mr. Hoar would not offer it unless it met the approval of the finance committee. He said his amendment was a proposition to refund to charitable and educational institutions the taxes they had placed on legacies left to them while the old law was in operation.

Mr. Aldrich said the amendment would be out of place, as this bill was simply to repeal certain specific war taxes. Mr. Hoar therefore did not offer his amendment.

The bill was read a third time, reported to the senate and then passed. The oleomargarine bill was passed by a vote of 52 to 15. It went into executive session and at 5:10 p. m. adjourned until Monday.

PASS RIVER AND HARBOR BILL.
Washington, March 21.—The house today passed the river and harbor bill.

which has been under discussion throughout all the week. Although several amendments were adopted, not a single dollar was added to the measure and as passed it carries exactly what it did when it came from the committee. Mr. Sulzer of New York attempted to force a record vote on the final passage of the bill, but only three members, Messrs. Smith of Iowa, Fitzgerald of Maryland and Cochran of Maryland supported him.

Mr. Mahon of Pennsylvania, chairman of the committee on claims, asked for unanimous consent that the senate report accepting the bill be amended to the effect that the bill be sent to conference. He thought the bill should take its regular course.

Retaliating for this action, Mr. Mahon objected to a request that the senate amendments to the executive, legislative and judicial appropriation bill be not considered, and that it be sent to conference. The house then went into committee of the whole and resumed the consideration of the river and harbor bill.

To Protect Miners in Territories.
Washington, March 21.—The senate committee on mining has made a favorable report on the house bill for the protection of miners in the territories, amending the bill so as to avoid the requirement for the use of shot-fires in lighting fires and inserting in its place a requirement that the dust in mines shall be settled by the use of water or carried out of the mines.

Wireless Telegraph Monopoly.
Berling, March 21.—Prof. Slaby, who with Count Arco, created the Slaby-Arco wireless telegraph system, is advocating international agreement to regulate the wireless transmission of messages on the ground that the use of the greatest good cannot be obtained from wireless telegraphy. He repeats the assertion, previously made here, that with his backing of British capital Mr. Marconi may obtain a monopoly for aerial transmission, as has already been done in the case of the cable.

ocean telegraphy. In this connection Prof. Slaby mentions the refusal of the Marconi station at Nantucket to receive wireless dispatches from the Hamburg-American steamer Deutschland.

Prof. Slaby says he has the highest personal regard for Marconi, whose system of wireless telegraph he believes to equal his own.

ADULTERATED FOOD.
Dr. Wiley Tells How Impure Jellies Are Made and Colored.

Washington, March 21.—The house committee room of the committee on commerce presented the appearance of a laboratory today, as Dr. Wiley, chief of the bureau of chemistry of the agricultural department, presented to the committee many samples of adulterated foods, in connection with his advocacy of the Hepburn pure food bill.

It was well known, he said, that the basis of certain jellies was apple skins and cores, these by-products also being shipped to Europe for making champagne.

The methods of coloring and flavoring jellies so as to deceive the eye and taste were each detailed. Dr. Wiley maintained that it was not fair that these making pure goods should be undersold by those making adulterated goods, and he urged in particular that the agricultural interests receive the protection of the pure food law.

Bryan Doesn't Trouble Cleveland.
Princeton, N. J., March 21.—Ex-President Cleveland was today shown a dispatch from Lincoln, Neb., which said that W. J. Bryan, commenting editorially in the Commoner upon Mr. Cleveland's recent letter to a Mississippi editor, denounced him as a "traitor in general and political neutrality."

"I am not at all troubled about it," was the only comment Mr. Cleveland would make. The ex-president was asked what he thought of the prospects of pulling together the Democratic party for the next presidential campaign, and replied: "I don't know much about it, but there seems to be some effort in that direction. I do not care to express any further opinion on it at present."

CUBAN TARIFF REDUCTION.

Gov. Gen. Woods Holds That it is
Not Sufficient.

A CRISIS MAY BE INVOLVED

He Says it May be Reached Unless
There is a Greater Concession—
Cuba Depend on United States.

Chicago, March 22.—Gov. Gen. Wood holds that the contemplated reduction of 20 per cent in the Cuban tariff is not sufficient.

"The island is ready now to be turned over to the Cubans," said Gen. Wood to the Tribune's correspondent at Savannah, Ga., where he stopped on his way to Washington from Havana.

"I probably will remain in Cuba a few weeks after the change in governments, and we will probably keep a few troops on the island for a time after the change. It seems to be the wish of the Cubans that we do that."

Gen. Wood says that, unless a greater reduction in the Cuban tariff on sugar than 20 per cent is made, a crisis may soon be reached in the island's affairs. The people are depending upon the United States giving them a market for their sugar and tobacco, and they have every reason to expect that this government will give them the relief.

"It is absolutely necessary to the welfare of the island that the tariff on sugar be reduced not less than 23 1/3 per cent. We may as well make up our minds to that if the island is to prosper, and we are responsible for the future of the island and its prosperity."

"I do not believe that a reduction of 33 1/3 per cent on Cuban sugar and tobacco would be detrimental to any one in the United States."

GEN. MILES' TESTIMONY.

All that He Said Before the Committee Will Not Be Told.

Washington, March 21.—The printed testimony of Gen. Miles before the senate committee on military affairs has not yet been made public, and it is understood that it will be submitted to him for approval. It is well understood that a great deal of what the general said will not appear in the record.

Members of the committee say the report published yesterday afternoon was correct in substance in every particular. At the same time, they say, they do not agree that Gen. Miles can be punished for his utterances before the committee, whether they appear in the record or not.

Senators on the committee could take no action to prevent the retirement of Gen. Miles. That, under the law, is purely an executive act and needs no confirmation or approval of the senate.

ENLARGEMENT OF WHITE HOUSE

President Roosevelt Has the Matter Under Consideration.

Washington, March 21.—President Roosevelt had among his callers today Representative Mercer of Nebraska, chairman of the house committee on public buildings and grounds, and one of the topics discussed was the enlargement of facilities for transacting the White House business.

Heretofore there have been plans for remodeling and enlarging the White House in order to meet present requirements. It appears, however, that President Roosevelt is decidedly opposed to changing in any material way the arrangement of this historic structure, believing that it should be preserved about as it is now. Under these circumstances enlarged facilities would have to be provided elsewhere.

At one time there was a suggestion of a presidential residence outside of the White House, which would be devoted to official business. But the present tendency is in favor of making the White House a presidential establishment for the president, locating the official quarters elsewhere. Senator Buchanan has proposed that the new department of justice have a branch for the executive business. It is understood also that Atty.-Gen. Knox has a plan for increasing the executive facilities. The matter has not yet gone beyond the stage of being canvassed by those most concerned.

An Epidemic of Lawlessness.

Austin, Texas, March 22.—For the past two weeks there has been an epidemic of burglaries and lawlessness at Litton Springs, this county, and last night it developed that the lawbreakers have organized into a sort of vendetta. Reports from Litton Springs at midnight were that there had been trouble between the lawless element and the citizens. The outlaws are said to have assembled shortly after midnight last night and began their maneuvers by shooting into the Palmer house, which seems to be their central point of attack. The citizens turned out in pursuit with bloodhounds. The dogs were killed by the outlaws and at 1 o'clock this morning it was reported that the outlaws were surrounded at Holter's Tank. They are said to be entrenched behind a dam, bidding defiance to the citizens' posse. Two of the posse have been injured and it is thought that the outlaws have suffered some, as quite a number of shots have been exchanged. At 2 o'clock a. m. a posse of citizens left the city for the scene of the attack and it is thought that with the coming of daylight the outlaws will be captured.

What British Trust Must Do.

New York, March 22.—There is only one opinion in the city with regard to the tobacco war—the British trust must amend its scheme or go under, says the Tribune's London correspondent. A representative meeting of wholesale and retail tobacco dealers of London, which has just been held to consider the rival proposals pledged its members not to do themselves any injury by monopoly, and ended with singing "Rule Britannia," and groaning for the Imperial Tobacco company. The shares of the British trust fluctuated wildly on Friday but closed unchanged.

Germany's Game in China.

New York, March 22.—Germany is once more playing a strong game in China, cables the Berlin correspondent of the Herald. According to private dispatches received by the owners of mining and railway concessions here, large squads of laboring men have been ordered to the Shantung valley whither special freighters of the North German Lloyd and Hamburg-American lines are en route with railway material to complete the main portion of the Shantung railway, which connects the port of Tientsin with a rich coal and mining district in Weihsien, and which must be completed by June 1 of this year according to the conditions imposed by the Chinese government. A LOTTERY FRAUD.

Washington, March 21.—Senator Azpiz, the Mexican ambassador to the United States, today issued the following statement concerning the advertisement published for several years of an alleged lottery in the state of San Luis Potosi, Mexico, tickets of which have been sold, and even, he says, imaginary lists of prizes published:

"There is not and never has been such a lottery in the Mexican state of San Luis Potosi. The advertisers of this alleged enterprise forged lottery tickets and lists of prizes, and have persistently practiced these frauds on the people of this country inclined to indulge in games of chance. The former legation and now embassy of Mexico in Washington several times has denounced the fraud to the government of the United States, asking for appropriate action to suppress these punishable abuses. The postoffice department has prescribed measures for the prevention of the fraud, but in spite of them it is still practiced, as I have informed the state department, the last time on Feb. 20.

"I have no doubt that the government of the United States will make every effort for the suppression of the fraud, but it seems to me that the press, so zealous for the people's interest and ever disposed to help the authorities in the prosecution and punishment of misdeeds, would render a great service in denouncing by means of publicity this fraud, whose victims are incautious persons who buy tickets of a lottery that does not exist and never has existed in the Mexican state of San Luis Potosi."

Immense Price for a Book.

New York, March 22.—In the sale of the library of M. Bordes de Bordesaux, at the Hotel Drouot, "Pastorale de Daphne et Cioce," in Greek, with drawings by Prudhon, and De Gerard, brought \$1,500, according to the Paris correspondent of the Herald.

TOBACCO WAR IN ENGLAND.

In Retaliation English Co. Will Invade American Market.

New York, March 22.—In retaliation for the American Tobacco company's attempt to seize the English markets, the Imperial Tobacco company of England will, according to the Herald, carry the war into the enemy's country. Plans are now being perfected, and are nearly consummated as a result of which millions may be spent in this country in a war against the American company that will be stupendous. It will be through the Universal Tobacco company and its allied corporations that the war will be waged here.
