Washington, March 21 .- Two impor-Mant measures were passed by the senate today, the bill for the repeal of the war revenue taxes and that for the protection of the president of the United States. The war revenue bill was passed without division, and after only one short speech. Mr. Tillman embraced the opportunity afforded by the bill's consideration to protest against the repeal of the duty of ten cents a pound upon tea.

The for-ner legation and now embassy of Mexo in Washington several times has deounced the fraud to the government f the United States, asking for appropriate action to suppress these pun-ishable abuses. The postoffice depart-ment has prescribed measures for the prevention of the fraud, but in spite of them it is still practiced, as I have informed the state department, the last time on Feb. 20.
