FATAL ACCIDENT IN FREIGHT YARDS

Leonard Williams Has Life
Crushed Out Between
Freight Cars.

C. H. CALLAND OUT ON BOND.

Discrepancies Adjusted and Prosecution May be Waived—C. H. Schaefer Convicted.

Ogden, Utah, Nov. 7.—A fatal accident occurred in the Union depot freight yards here, shortly after 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon, when Leonard Williams, a well known young man of Ogden lost his life, crushed out between two freight cars.

From eye witnesses to the sad accident it was learned that Mr. Williams, who belonged to a Union Pacific switching crew, was with the crew doing some switching near Twenty-eighth street. He went between two cars to couple them up when in some manner he was caught between the draw-heads of the cars and terribly crushed through the hips. A conductor and brakeman from another train saw the accident and called to the train crew. The cars were separated and Mr. Williams fell to the ground. The crew and a number of other gentlemen rushed to his assistance and notified the yard officer. The ambulance was soon on the scene and the young man started for the hospital, but he died from the injuries before medical attention could be given.

Mr. Williams was born in Ogden about 25 years ago and has lived here all his life. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Hyrum Williams and a grandson of the late Dr. Williams. He leaves a wife and one small child.

The funeral will be held at 11 o'clock Sunday at his father's residence at Rexburg, Idaho, and is not expected to arrive in Ogden before tomorrow.

C. H. CALLAND GETS BAIL.

Money Discrepancies Have Been Adjusted. Prosecution May be Waived.

Ogden, Nov. 7.—C. H. Calland, the Oregon Short Line claim agent who absconded a couple of months ago, it is alleged with about \$4,000 of the railroad company's money, and gave himself up to the officers at Denver about a month ago and has since been in the county jail, was yesterday afternoon released from custody on a bond furnished by H. C. Bigelow and F. W. Harrington. His bond was reduced to \$1,000. It is understood the money

taken from the railroad company has been satisfactorily arranged so that even if his case ever does come to trial the punishment may be light. Mr. Calland was a trusted employee of the railroad company, and was a favorite among his fellow employees. When the announcement was made of his having absconded with the company's money it caused the greatest surprise. His wife has been a faithful visitor to him daily at the county jail, always taking some dainties for him to eat.

CONVICTED OF FORGERY.

C. H. Schaefer was given a hearing in the district court yesterday before a jury of his peers on the charge of forging the name of C. F. Groat, the well known feed and grain merchant, to a \$1240 check which he passed on a local saloon. The testimony was conclusive of his guilt and the jury brought in a verdict in keeping with the same. Sentence will be passed Thursday morning.

Suit has been filed in the Second district court by Drs. Rich and Osgood against John L. Birchfield to recover \$450 alleged to be due for medical services.

VICTIM OF ALCOHOLISM.

Robert Taylor, 34 years of age, died at the city jail yesterday from the effects of alcoholism. He claimed to have relatives living at Wilmington, North Carolina. He came to the city jail Saturday and asked to be given a place to sleep. He had been drinking heavily and had the delirium tremens. He was given medical attention, but could not survive the attack. His body is at the morgue awaiting disposition.

ASSAULTED BY VICIOUS GREEK.

Frank Halsey was assaulted by a foreigner with a knife last night near Twenty-second street and Washington avenue just because he did not answer a question as to whether he was a Greek. The man asked Halsey when he came to the springs left, to which he replied he did not know. The Greek quickly slashed a knife and cut Halsey a slash on the arm. Dr. Egan dressed the wound. No arrests were made.

Result of Battle of the Ballots in The Leading Towns of Utah.

RICHFIELD.

Special Correspondence. Richfield, Utah, Nov. 6.—The entire Republican ticket was elected here yesterday with pluralities ranging from 38 to 397. Even the Democratic candidate for marshal, who is the present incumbent and who has now held the office for two consecutive terms, was defeated by a decisive majority. HEBER CITY.
