LOSES LIFE IN A HORSE RACE

William Howard, a Youth of 16,
Meets Untimely Death Through
Sporting Accident.

RY. SHOPMEN AGAIN LAID OFF

Married 20 Years and Drunk Half the
Time—Soldier of Fortune—Court
Notes—News Briefs.

Ogden, June 18.—William Howard, 16 years old, and son of John G. and Adeline Howard, died at the Ogden general hospital yesterday afternoon at about 4 o'clock from injuries received by being thrown from a horse, which he was riding in a race with a companion.

A short time ago the Howards moved to Willard from Pleasant View, and young Howard had returned to the latter place to visit a boy acquaintance. In company with Clyde Marsh the boy went riding and when they came to a straight piece of road, a race was proposed and accepted. Both the horses were running at a good speed. Suddenly the Howard mount became loosened and before the horse could be stopped went so close to a telephone pole that young Howard was thrown with great force against the pole.

Assistance was rendered the boy as soon as possible, who remained conscious about 15 minutes after the accident. Dr. Morrell was summoned and had the boy taken to the hospital as soon as possible. After an examination it was found that the skull had been fractured and the leg broken near the thigh. At the hospital the patient began to grow weaker and it was found that there was small chance of recovery as nothing could be done to relieve the pressure on the brain caused by the formation of a blood clot. The boy remained in an unconscious condition until the end came yesterday afternoon.

R. R. WORKERS LAID OFF.

The first time in more than a month the men, about 500 in number, in the Southern Pacific shops in this city, were laid off yesterday afternoon and Monday morning. This action the railroad company claims is taken owing to the fact that there is no work and all the repairing has been caught up with. When the news spread about the shops late yesterday afternoon there was great surprise among the men who have not as yet worked a full month straight through in more than six months.

Married 20 years and drunk half the time is a charge that Brastus Christofferson of Ogden in a divorce complaint brought by his wife, Annie L. Christofferson. The complaint, which was filed yesterday afternoon, alleges that the couple were married in Salt Lake City, March 24, 1886, and have four children, of whom the plaintiff asks the custody. The complaint further alleges that the defendant has been drunk more than half the time that they have been married.
