ST. GEORGE ON THE LINE.

Stat and California Amended Articles of Incorporation.

The Utah & California Railroad company has filed with the secretary of state a copy of its articles of incorporation. The amendment is to article three and is as follows:

"Article III.—This corporation is organized for the purpose of manufacturing, equipping, acquiring, owning, maintaining and operating, by steam, electric and other motive power, a railroad, including the most feasible route from Salt Lake City in Salt Lake county, State of Utah, southward through the mountains, to the western boundary line of the state of Utah, at a point near the center of the southern line of latitude 38° 30' north, running west of the Great Salt Lake, a distance of about

seventy-five miles; and a branch line of said railroad connecting the main line at or near Cedar City, Iron county, Utah, and extending to an elevation of 5,000 feet above the level of the sea, and continuing westward to the mountains, where the branch line of said railroad intersects the main line at or near Cedar City, Iron county, Utah, and extending to a point in the mountains, to the point of junction of the branch line of said railroad with the main line of said railroad, a distance of about twenty-five miles."

From the amendment it will be seen that Provo, Cedar City and St. George will have a railroad, the former, or main line going from Salt Lake, and a branch line directly connecting Cedar City with branches east and west of that place for industrial purposes.
