

THE COUNTY COURT.

Determination of the New Board to Put in Full Time.

AN INTERESTING BILL OF FAIR.

Supt. Human Would Like to Hold on —Mr. Smart Doesn't Want to —Not in the Justicet.

At yesterday afternoon's session of the County court Selectman Cabot presided; Messrs. Bamberger and Morris were also present.

TWO CLAIMS.

The claim of Remington & Johnson (\$50) for the sheriff was refused. That of J. C. Murphy (\$25.75) for lodges, stumps furnished the sheriff, was allowed.

MURKIN'S APPLICATION.

The application of Sheriff McQuinn for office furniture and telephone was referred to the jail and infirmary committee.

INDIGENT.

Selectman Bamberger reported favorably upon the purchase of a ticket to Chicago for Peter McInerny, and the report was adopted. Resolved that \$200 be appropriated to Selectman Bamberger for the purpose of affording immediate relief to indigent persons.

EVENING FUN.

The matter of the \$639.92 to the credit of the stray fund, as mentioned by the treasurer in his annual report, was referred to the county attorney.

THE IRRIGATION RELIEF TAX.

J. E. Dooly et al. petitioned for an appropriation to pay for a relief map of this valley, showing the irrigation system now in operation, the location of Salt Lake City and the surrounding country, as requested by the Utah World's Fair Commission. The clerk was instructed to notify the secretary of the commission to meet with them on Monday, at which time they will consider the matter.

HINMAN SAYS "IF YOU PLEASE."

Mr. J. H. Hinman, superintendent of the county infirmary, and May Hinman, his wife, matron, sent in a petition asking for re-appropriation. They called attention to the fact that among other requisites they did as much as possible to afford for the comfort of patients every during the last campaign, as well as for the past ten years, as any who may apply for the position. They further state that no fault has been found in their management of the institution by either the county or the state, and if necessary they can secure the endorsement of a number of good business men who are Liberals, and others who are not. The petition was laid over until a later date.

FROM DR. ALLEN.

Joe F. Allen petitioned for the position of superintendent of the county infirmary. No action was taken, further than to lay over until the next meeting.

TAX ABATEMENT.

The representative of Hibout & Crapo, asking an abatement of taxes owing him for the first three months of 1892, was destroyed by fire some time ago, was referred to the county attorney.

NEW ROAD SUPERVISOR.

R. L. Kent applied for the position of road supervisor for Granger precinct, and the petition was granted.

C. H. Stanton, secretary of the joint city and county building committee, sent in a communication with reference to the petition taken by C. C. Goodwin upon the recommendation of the committee that Messrs. Doremus and Pratt be sent to San Francisco to inspect plans for fireproofing.

Joseph Muir et al. called attention to the need of having Ninth East street repaired between Twelfth and Thirteenth South streets. The letter was filed.

THE PAUPER ACCOUNT.

Sheriff McQuinn sent in a receipt for \$15 received from A. J. Burt, belonging to the pauper account.

CAN DO WITHOUT IT.

The following resolution was adopted:

On motion of George D. Miller, it was voted to have the following resolution introduced in the Legislature:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this assembly that the joint city and county building committee in regard to the proposed fireproofing of the city hall, should be directed to examine and report upon certain fireproofing there done under the Hansen-Smith system; now is it the sense of this assembly that the city engineer and the architect in charge of the city hall and county buildings are better qualified to pass judgment upon the proposed fireproofing system, than are the members of the court; therefore, be it

Resolved, That it is the sense of this assembly that the joint city and county building committee in recommending that City Engineer Doremus with Architects Hansen and Smith be directed to go to California to examine the work of the Hansen-Smith fireproofing system and reporting to the joint committee the proposed fireproofing system, then the same is to be submitted to the City Council and the expenses of such committee to be assumed proportionately by both the city and county.

CITY SCHOOL BOARD.

Employment of Teachers, 1 Street Swever, Financial Statement and Appropriations.

The city school board met in regular weekly session last night. The members were all present and they transacted business as follows:

The appropriations of W. V. Black, Niel Melander and W. H. Archibald were referred to the committee on furniture and supplies.

The committee on sites and buildings reported recommending the acceptance of the bids of Midgley & Sons Co. to do certain work in the Lowell school; that the general contractor of the Jackson school be authorized to permit the sub-contractors for the plumbing to substitute certain other materials referred to in a letter from them of recent date; that the committee be authorized to contract for certain work needed in the Lowell, Lincoln, Hamilton and Franklin school buildings; that Midgley & Sons be requested to run the heating plant at the Lowell school; that the new term be opened on January 30th, the board to pay for the fuel and the persons in charge of the plant. Adopted.

The committee on furniture and supplies recommended that authority be given them to have ten tables made for use in first grade rooms in the public schools; twelve tables for use as lunch tables, and for the purchase of clocks for the Hamilton, Lincoln, Bryant and Lowell schools; that the price of numbers on each door of the new school buildings. Adopted.

The committee on teachers and school work recommended the employment of the following teachers at schools now vacant and at the salaries offered their names:

Miss Elizabeth Quattlebaum, principal, Hamilton school, \$125 per month; F. D. Kester, principal, Lincoln school, \$125 per month; Miss Letitia Arnold, tenth ward school, \$100 per month.

Mrs. Grace Young, Hunter school, \$60 per month.

Mrs. Barbara Hofer, Hunter school, \$60 per month.

Mrs. Mary McCormick, Lincoln school, \$75 per month.

Mrs. Nellie V. Clark, Lincoln school, \$60 per month.

Mrs. Florence Leavenworth, Lincoln school, \$75 per month.

Mrs. Mary A. Conard, Thirteenth school, \$60 per month.
