## REMOVAL OF COUNTY SEAT. Question to be Voted on Next Election-

Funeral of William Luke. Special Correspondence.

Manti, Sanpete Co., Oct. 5.-There is a movement on foot in this county at the present time having for its purpose the removing of the county seat from Manti to Ephraim, a neighboring seven miles north. A largely town signed petition, containing something over 3,000 signatures of residents of Ephraim and precincts north, was filed yesterday with the county clerk. The commisioners are in session, and will take action on the matter of mak-ing the proposition of the removal or non-removal a part of the ticket to be voted at the coming election. While a determined and vigorous effort is being made by Ephraim to become the county seat, and while the effort is receiving some sympathy from the northern cities of the county, most right thinking people no matter where they reside will no doubt be loyal to the established order of things and VALUABLE BEET EXPERIMENT. either vote to keep Manti in the place where she with every propriety be-longs, or leave the proposition without voting at all. As against Manti and the south, it will be necessary for Ephraim and the north to go almost solidly for the change, something that is manifestly out of the question, as all

the sympathy is not one way in the northern part of the county. There are a good many people even in Eph-ram who do not favor the change, nad word comes to Manti from every town word comes to Manti from every town the other side of Ephraim that there is no desire for a change on the part of many a prominent citizen. There seems to be no good, substantial rea-son for the change. Manti is the old-est city in Sanpete valley, and his-torically one of the most interesting cities in the state. To move the county seat to Enhrate would simply place if seat to Ephraim would simply place it seven miles nearer the center of the
