Suicide Through Financial Troubles
and Disappointed Love.

THE ANOTHER DENVER MYSTERY.

Disastrous and Deadly Fire in San
Francisco—A Young Woman
Hangs Herself.

An insane Italian wandered away
from his home near San Francisco a
few days ago and was not seen until
his remains were found on the mountainside track, and had been cut
in two by an engine.

The mistress of John Peterson, of
Hollister, Cal., was found dead yesterday
after a morning walk in Hollister
and while no dangerous injury was
privately uttered about the scene and
one died badly injured.

A. Kestner, an Auburn, Cal.,
resident, was shot yesterday
night at 10 o'clock by two masked
rogues, who fired at 2700
Kestner's house and were at
the moment of the attack.

A disastrous fire, causing loss of
nearly thousand dollars worth of
property, broke out in Hollister, Brown
Co., last evening. The building
was destroyed in a short time, and the
fire spread suddenly, throwing two
men over the wheels. One man was
severed from his body.

A young woman leaped herself in
the flames for her jewels at San
Francisco on Monday night. When
she was taken out of the building
she lay unconscious, but recovery
was taking place. Late yesterday
she was taken to St. Luke's hospital.
When she learned where she was the
dead of shock in the place drove her
to suicide.

P. N. Stamps, a well known printer
of Los Angeles, dropped dead at his
home in Los Angeles on Monday even-
ing. He was the president of the
National Bank of Los Angeles, and
had been a member of the Typographical
Union of that city and the pres-
ident of that organization.

A Hebrew (Mont.) day school has
expelled Frank H. Cunningham, who
is charged with embezzling nearly
\$1000 from the Great Northern Express
company's office here. Cunningham
has been in the employ of the
express company only one week.
About October 31st, he charged, he
left New York with all the company's
money and paper that he could get
hand.

The Denver News says that the
police have arrested a man named
Mack and mystery. About 11 o'clock
Monday morning a man whose name
the police and authorities are unable to
ascertain, was found unconscious at
the side of a railroad in the rear of
Mark's street. He was taken to police
station, where it was discovered that
he was under the influence of
alcohol. After being given stimulants
and battery removed to the county hospital, he will de-
cide.

On Tuesday evening, says the Mill-
wood Progress, Mr. George Greenway
returned from San Francisco with
the news of his son's drowning, which
had been reported in the papers. He
wrote to the strong arm of the law and
George's hunting scenes and that his family has been
increased, as it is the case, and the chil-
dren will be happy, having come
out of their mother, his a wonder-
ful father.

The Dr. James Neff (Utah) says
the strongest evidence at that time
has been developed to the person of
one E. L. Cutler. His wife has been
very ill for several weeks now and
the police and authorities are unable to
ascertain what caused the death of several
months ago. A part of a letter
was taken and handed to the police
with several of the ladies finding
it valuable, taking the handwriting,
clipping and measurement. The wife
has since recovered and the money was
paid to the widow.

Thomas H. Wilkins, bookkeeper
for the Western Granite company at
Utah, Wash., was a prominent young
man in amateur theatricals and operas,
having made his debut in May with
three grand matinees. Financial
troubles and disappointment in love
drove him to the stage. Two
months ago Wilkins was arrested for
uttering checks that were returned
stamped "no funds." He wrote a letter
to a newspaper saying that he put
into the safe day after he was ar-
rested, and that the money was
not there. Yesterday he purchased a
small quantity of meat, bone from each
of three druggists, saying that he had
nothing. This time he left no trace.
Well, message, and amateur physician
had worked with him six weeks. His
parents in England are reported to
be wealthy.
