Gladstone's Resignation—Bombardment of Paris a Failure thus far. The World has a cable dispatch from London, which says there was an immense meeting, to-night, at Greenwich, to demand Gladstone's resignation.

WASHINGTON.

Another railway robbery—Nomination. WASHINGTON.—The President has nominated Geo. L. Murphy to be Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of Montana.

CALIFORNIA.

Branch of N. P. R. E. to be Protected. SAN FRANCISCO, 10.—The Board of Supervisors of San Francisco have passed a resolution, asking Congress to grant to the City of San Francisco the use of the major portion of the Presidential military reservation for a public park.

FOREIGN NEWS.

FRANCE.

The bombardment. VERSAILLES, Monday night.—Last night the fire from the batteries was increased. To-day there is a dense fog and the bombardment is not so heavy; while the return fire from the French guns is weak.

PRUSSIA.

Terrible fighting at Danjontin.—Loss taken up. BERLIN, 9.—Von Werder has been heavily reinforced. The Prussians in the department of Yone are concentrating at Joigny, on the Paris and Lyons railway.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Bismarck and the sinking of British colliers—New Home Secretary—Exchange of wounded and prisoners. LONDON, 9.—Count Bernstorff, the

Prussian minister, has received the following telegram from Bismarck: "VERSAILLES, 8.—The report of the German commander at Bosen, reporting the sinking of English colliers, has not arrived, but the facts are known.

Tell Lord Granville that we sincerely regret that our troops, to avert imminent danger, were obliged to seize British ships. We admit the claim for indemnity, and if unjustifiable acts were committed, we will call the guilty to account.

(Signed,) BISMARCK. Further explanations represent that the vessels were seized through fear that the French would use them to land troops.

The Right Honorable W. Monsell, M. P. from Limerick, has offered the Pope a residence on his Estate in Ireland.

LONDON, 10.—Mr. Shaw Lefevre has been appointed Secretary of State for the Home Department.

La Patrie says the financial is worse than the military situation, and proposes a return to Assignats.

Col. Pratt, director of the Anglo-American ambulance corps, has gone to Bordeaux to negotiate for an exchange of wounded and prisoners, of whom there are now a large number on both sides.

HAVANA, 10.—The wife of Cespedes has arrived here; she will probably be allowed to go to the United States.
