**A BATTLE!**  
Rumored Offensive and Defensive  
alliance between Russia  
and Austria!

**GERMANS EXPECT TO BE IN PARIS  
ON THE 16th!**

**OHIO.**  
A Seducer Shot.

CLEVELAND.—Dr. W. H. Jones, a prominent physician residing in West Side, was shot and instantly killed, this morning, by Dr. Gallentine for alleged seduction of his wife. Gallentine immediately surrendered himself to the police and is now under arrest awaiting an examination. A special to the western press, dated Tours, 7, says enthusiasm is increasing, volunteers are rapidly swelling the ranks of the two armies now forming. The Prussians seem to be determined to advance into Normandy. The people in that province are sending their grain and cattle further South, and are placing every obstacle possible in the way of the Prussians.

**INDIANA.**  
INDIANAPOLIS.—J. S. Harvey, an old and prominent lawyer of this city and ex-treasurer of State, dropped dead in his office yesterday, of heart disease.

**VIRGINIA.**  
Fatal Explosion.

EVANSVILLE, 7.—A terrible explosion occurred, yesterday, in a saw mill in Richmond, Spence County. Two young men were killed and terribly mangled; two others were seriously injured.

**NEW YORK.**

NEW YORK, 7.—Late correspondence from Vienna states that the most intimate relations exist between Austria and Russia, and in the event of the latter power making any demonstration against Prussia, Austria will certainly become her ally. It is believed, upon what is considered good authority, that a secret alliance of an offensive and defensive character has already been concluded between the two governments.

**FOREIGN NEWS.**

**FRANCE.**  
Sortie from Metz—French tireurs de campagne—French cannonading.

ST. QUENTIN, 7.—The enemy now seems to be abandoning his march on to this point.

It is reported that the entire German force, which has been operating in this direction, is now moving upon Sedan, which is able to make an energetic defense.

ROUEN, 8.—Several French speculators have lately been caught sending supplies to the invaders; they were all arrested.

Tours, 8.—It is reported that Gambetta recently left Paris in a balloon and landed safely outside the Prussian lines, and that he is now on his way to Tours.

The Prussians have attacked New Breischach. The cannonade is sharp; the besieged answer vigorously.

VERSAILLLES, 7, via London, 8.—The French maintain a vigorous cannonade on the Prussian outposts.

News from Chateau to the seventh, states that the French tireurs were defeated at Ables. One hundred and thirty Prussian horsemen captured sixty of the French and many horses. A despatch received from the mayor of Arthenay states that eight hundred French tireurs had been driven back by a force of the Prussians.

VERSAILLLES, 8.—Last night the entire garrison of Metz, including the national guard, made a sortie on both banks of the Moselle. Their attack was on an entrenched position of the Germans, which was repulsed, when they returned to the fortress with the loss of 1,500 men. The Prussian loss was 600.

**AUSTRIA.**

VIENNA, 8.—An extraordinary cabinet meeting was held to-day and it is rumored that there are serious complications with the Prussian government.

**GREAT BRITAIN.**

Heavy fighting—Conflicting reports about the condition of Paris.

LONDON, 8.—The following details, collected from various sources, are published here to-day: The Italian government has formally repudiated any design of looking to the annexation of Nice and Savoy. The result of the plebiscite in the Roman States is officially published as follows: For Italian unity 13,365 against 1,507; majority, 11,858.

A dispatch from Epinal, dated the 7th, reports sharp fighting, yesterday, between Roon, Lettner and Bruyeres, in the department of the Vosges. The Prussian force consisted of about nine thousand men, and the French force not so large and had much less artillery than the Germans. The fighting lasted all day, and, when night ended the conflict, the event was undecided. The French retained their position. The Germans attempted to carry it a number of times. General Dupre, the French commander, was slightly wounded in the engagement.

The Prussians have arrived before New Breischach and skirmishing has already commenced.

George Saunders writes from Paris, that the city is in a good for a six months' siege. The Pall Mall Gazette, has a correspondent there who writes in a similar strain. Another dispatch, however, says that Paris is at the mercy of the Prussian guns on the heights of Ville Jeuf.

There are no Prussians in the department of the Aube.

The Prussians again threaten Glazov, where they were repulsed by the national guard, five days ago.

The redoubt of Pierrepotte, near St. Denis, has been abandoned by the French, the position being untenable.

Two Prussians who were caught cutting telegraph wires were immediately shot by the Prussians.

The Manchester Guardian of to-day has a special telegram which announces that the bombardment of Paris will begin early next week. The cannonade will be preceded by a formal summons to surrender. The Prussians to-day opened a cannonade at several points with eight guns. Yesterday, when the French attacked Rummel's division, the French imperial guard was engaged. The French directed several divisions against the first and tenth Prussian corps on the right bank of the Moselle river. The cannonade was severe. The losses of Rummel, and of the tenth corps amounts to five hundred men, and those of the third corps to a hundred and thirty men. A telegram to the Times, dated Berlin, 11 a.m., says that on the hill between Sevres and St. Cloud batteries of siege guns have been placed. A battery at St. Cloud threatens the neighborhood of the Elysian fields. Dispatches from Rouen state that Gambetta is expected at that place, and an honorable reception awaits him. A special to the Times, dated London, 8, says correspondence from the headquarters of the Prussian King states that the guns for the siege of Paris are in place, and, in another week, an assault will begin on the anniversary of the battle of Leipzig. On the 16th the Germans count on being in Paris.
