

## THE BIG FISTIC CONTEST TONIGHT

George Gardner and Mike Schreck Will Meet at Salt Lake Theater.

### WHAT THE FIGHT FANS THINK.

While the Lowell Man is the Favorite Here, Schreck Has a Remarkably Large Following Also.

That will be the greatest contest of the kind given in this city since the famous "Red" and "Blue" affair in the stadium. Both sides are anxious to know the outcome of local fight fans. So much interest is centered in this match that a delegation of about 100 prominent men from Denver and Denver's number of fighters intends coming in Denver last night. Some are coming from the coast, it is reported.

Both fighters have a work and each claims to be in fine fettle. Gardner arrived in the city last night. He looks to be fit for the battle of his life. He says he is stronger than ever before than ever.

Ward Bean is to referee the contest, and it is expected the Theater will be packed to the walls when the curtain falls.

Billy Gibson, Gardner's manager, says: "George is in great shape and will surely be returned the winner. If Schreck can be beaten he will be the first to congratulate the German."
